In the first start, the contest for the Sir Thomas De War trophy, t racer made the mile in 321-5 seconds. the

Rain during the morning delayed the starting of the racer and the course was not in the very best condition for high speeding. In the one-mile international for the De War trophy the preliminary heats were run, Marriott, Lancia and Cedrino qualifying for the final. The second heat was particularly close, only three-fifths of a second separating Lan place. In the final Marriott won, going the mile in 33 seconds flat.
