#### SALOON MEN AND REFORM.

If They Are Made to Close on Sunday, They Insist Other Business Shall Stop.

Wedding Bells - Suspected Burglars Arrested-Orehard Experiments-Family Row Aired in Court.

The saloon men do not take kindly to the movement to have their places of business closed on Sunday, and are organizing a peculiar method of combatting the movement of the citizens against vice. The saloon men say that if they are compelled to observe the Sunday law they will inaugurate a movement to make others observe it. They are not all united on the project, but the plan so far as matured is to close the saloons tight next Sunday, and on the following Sunday one saloon will be open all day. If the pro-prietor is fined, the combination will bail him out, as fast as arrested.

Following this the saloon and gambling element will inaugurate a Puritanical reform, and have enforced the ordinance against "all unnaecessary labor on the Sabbath," and have Glen-wood Park closed and all other business shut down, including the running of street cars and the sale of newspapers.
