New York, 4.

Havana advices to the 30th state that there were a few cases of yellow fever in the harbor.

The small pox had apparently run its course in Matamoras, though there were over five hundred cases there still.

At Demetria the yellow fever is raging; up to January 7, 160 cases were received in the hospital, of which 32 died.

The World's special says the highly important consultations which the President and Cabinet have been holding with leading southerners, on the new plan for reconstructing, ended last night in an agreement that the series of resolutions drawn up at the conference,

in favor of suffrage based on reading, writing and property qualification to the amount of \$200, should be submitted for adoption to the southern Legislatures, to pave the way for the submission of the question by the President in his message to the 40th Congress. These resolutions were sent to the Governors of the several southern states to-day accompanied by advisory letters stating that they met the President's approval.

The question of amnesty does not appear to have been an essential feature of the prepared plan.

The Governor of North Carolina was telegraphed to-night to keep the Legislature in session to consider these propositions, and similar messages were sent to the Governors of Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi. Governor Orr, of South Carolina left to-night to submit the plan to the Legislature of his own State.

A UNIQUE TOWN.—If the town of Dumbarton, N. H., could be added to Barnum's Museum, it would doubtless be considered the greatest curiosity and marvellous collection. What entitles it to this distinction is the fact that, though it has a population of over 1,000, yet it has no pauper, no lawyer, no doctor; no hotel or liquor store, no manufactory of any description. With its own debt paid, and with the exception of a minister and two old maids, its inhabitants are all farmers. If such a town is not a "curiosity" in the nineteenth century, we hardly know what would be considered a curiosity. This is certainly a model, as well as unique town; for, as it has no lawyer, the people live at peace with themselves and the rest of mankind; as it has no doctor, the inhabitants live to a good old age; as it has no hotel or liquor store, the Dumbartonians are temperate, and consequently intelligent and well-to-do in the world; and as there are only two old maids in the place, it is evident that the young men heed the injunction that was laid on Adam when Eve was given him for a helpmate.
