I have known and weighed quantities of baking powder was inclosed in a silver crucible until only a gray residue was left. This is the *trial ash*. It was carefully removed to a glass dish and heated upon my hydrate of soda bath until it was white gray with fine particles of soda and coated upon my hydrate of soda bath. This is the *total ash*. The difference between the trial ash and total ash has been called *inscrutable ash*, and that which did not rise, the *scrutable ash*.
