At his residence, in the Eighth Ward, May 25th, 1880, from the effects of an injury two months ago when thrown from a vehicle JOHN Y. GREEN.

Deceased was born September 21, 1826, and was the son of John P. and Rhoda Young Green, well known in Nauvoo as personal friends of the Prophet Joseph. He came to Utah with the Pioneers and drove President Brigham Young's carriage. He participated in the toils and difficulties of frontier life, was well known in the community, and died in the faith of the Gospel, leaving a wife and eight children.

Funeral on Wednesday, at 11 a.m., in the Eighth Ward School-house. Friends invited.

In this city, of dropsy and bleeding of the lungs, JOHN LAFAYETTE, son of John and

Mary Catherine Barton Ivie; deceased was born in Mount Pleasant, Sanpete County, Utah, November 10, 1830, died May 22, 1880, aged 49 years, 6 months and 12 days.

The remains were taken to his home in Mount Pleasant, where the funeral services will be held.

Deceased lived a true Latter-day Saint, was beloved by all who knew him, and died in full faith of the Gospel. He leaves many relatives and friends to mourn his loss.




