





I forward for publication the fol-owing tribute to the memory of our departed brother, James Jepson, who departed this life September 26, 1881, in the 65th year of his age; was born at Astley Bridge, near Bolton, June 24, 1816; was baptized on the 7th of June, 1839, by Amos Fielding; was married June 7, 1840, to Miss Eleanor Nightingale, of Bolton, by whom he had six children, three of which lived to be married. In the year 1840, he was ordained an Elder, and was placed in charge of 13 branches of the Church around Bolton. On the 18th of September. Bolton. On the 13th of September, he left his native land for the land of Zion, by way of New Orleans, and arrived at St. Louis, where he remained three months; then sailed for Newscard Arrived Arri for Nauvoo, arrived April 11th, 1843, and resided there Learly four years; was through all the troubles of mol-bing and driving during the mar-tyrdom of the Prophet Joseph and his brother Hymm, according his brother Hyrum, spending much of his time on horseback guarding the people of the city from their enemics. Was ordained a member of the 6th Querum of Seventies. In the Spring of 1846, took his team and helped the Twelve Apostles away from Nauvoo; was gone eight weeks, then returned to Nauvoo and took his family down the river to St. Louis, in order to make a fit out. While in St. Louis he presided over the 4th ward of the Saints until the year 1852, when he emigrated to Salt Lake City, bringing with bim a company of Saints, as captain of 50, arriving August 26th, 1852, and settled in Sugar House Ward. Was one of the express company who went to Deer Creek, and was driven back by Johnson's army, and dur-ing the big move south, while ing the big move south, while Buchanan's army was coming in, settled in Spanish Fork. When peace was declared he returned to Salt Lake City, and was called in 1862 to go south and strengthen the Dixle settlements. He located in Virgen City, Kane County, and was ordained flist counselow to Bishop John Parker, an office he held at the time of his decease. He worked hard to make improvements on land and water ditches. Working in the Virgen River, he can ht cold, and rheumatic fever ensued, which was the cause of his death.

In June, 1879, he visited St. George Temple, where he received his second blessing, having received his first blessings in the Nauvoo Temple. He succeeded in making a comfortable home for his family for comfortable home for his family for many years. Held the office of postmaster. Was taken sick September 19th, and after a six days' illness breathed his last as if falling lato a gentle slumber, leaving a wife, three children, six grandchildren and numerous friends to mourn his

The third and most remarkable shot of the evening was the following: A pistol-barrel was placed in a small steel frame, directly behind which was a razor and on each side of the edge was suspended two glass balls. His next was the shooting of glass balls thrown into the air without aim, as a card was fastened on the point of his rifle. His average in this shooting was 96 per cent. With equal ease he succeeded in hreaking two balls with one shot. His last feat was done in remarkable time and effectiveness, and consisted of breaking about 15 balls in rapid succession with the use of his right arm, his left being secured to his side. During the shooting the boy missed a few of the less important shots, but this defect was owing in a great measure to the miserable lighting of the stage.—San Fran. Call, Oct. 2.

A Dangerous Balloon Trip.

M. Eugene Godard, the celebrated French seronaut, who was accompanied by three local journalists, very narrowly escaped a malancholy death recently, by the descent of his baloon in the Danube. The start was effected from a large pleasure garden in the neighborhood of Schonbrunn, at a quarter past seven. An immense crowd had assembled to witness the proceedings, and cheered vecificately as the huge certal craft rose majestically aloft. About an hour later a thunder storm of terrible violence broke out, and the gravest apprehensions were entertained for M. Godard and his companions. As it afterwards proved, they were only too well-founded. The balloon was caught in the midst of the thunder clouds, and thrice the lightning finehed within a few yards of its terror-stricken crew. M. Godard, however, kept his presence of mind, and after vainly endeavoring, by emptying the sandbage, to steer clear of the atorm, he decided to come down as quickly as possible.
