

SECY. BALLINGER ANSWERS CRITICS

Established Policy of Interior Department Regarding Public Lands Will Continue.

PEOPLE'S RIGHTS GUARDED.

Some Settlers Have Misunderstood Conditions—He and Pinchot Have No Controversy.

Helena, Mont., Aug. 19.—"As long as any public lands remain to be administered, there will be complaints," declared Secy. of the Interior Richard A. Ballinger here today, in answer to a controversy at Spokane and the complaints concerning the reclamation service. "No two people are constituted alike, and there is always ample opportunity for disagreement. Some of the settlers on the reclamation projects were ignorant of the conditions which would confront them, and they settled on the land in the expectation of reaping a fortune without the necessity of understanding irrigation methods. They have been disillusioned and now desire the government to release them from their contracts and to reimburse them for their expenditures."

TIME WILL RIGHT THINGS.

"Such difficulties are to be expected when a new work is taken up and they should not be allowed to assume too much importance when the whole work is taken into consideration. Time and experience will put the machine to running smoothly. No man can compass the future of irrigation in the west. The government has made a beginning, and a pretty good beginning, I believe. Fifty million dollars has been invested in these projects, and it will be turned back into the treasury as quickly as can be done without working a hardship on the settlers, and will then be reinvested in new projects."

"Since I entered the office of secretary of the interior I have administered its affairs, not as any extremist might dictate, but as I understood my duties. That will continue to be my policy."

"At the same time, I realize that there are some questions in the law governing the disposition of public lands which ought to be modified, and as soon as I shall have opportunity I shall suggest such changes as appear to me to be necessary in a report to Congress. In the meantime the established policy of the interior department will continue."

GROSS MISREPRESENTATIONS.

"There have been gross misrepresentations sent out regarding the action of the department in certain matters. Criticisms have been pretty severe from some quarters, but knowing that I am absolutely right in the position I have taken, I have paid no attention to them. In time it will be shown beyond a doubt that my course has been absolutely right."

"It will be shown also, when the facts are made known, despite the claims of the restoration of power sites during this administration, that actually more sites have been withdrawn during the administration than under the former, and that none withdrawn under the former administration have been 'grabbed.'"

"A short time ago there was a story bent out from Helena, as malicious as a story as was ever put before the public as truth. It purported to be the discovery of the filing on an immense amount of land which was to be turned over to the power trust, according to the yarn. It was made to appear also that this had been a recent filing allowed by the interior department."

"I took the pains to have this story investigated. I found that instead of being a recent filing it was an application for amendment and readjustment of a filing made 15 years ago, and that instead of 15,000 acres of land being concerned, there were only 150 acres. The rest of the story I discovered was also just as false."

NO DISPUTE WITH PINCHOT.

"Now, that was a malicious attack which gained wide circulation, I suppose, and for which there was not the slightest foundation in truth."

Mr. Pinchot and myself at the meeting of the irrigation congress in Spokane. I was invited there to make an address on the work of the interior department, as it affected matters in which the irrigators are interested. I delivered the address as requested on the attitude of the interior department toward the reclamation of the arid lands of the west. I did not enter into defense of my course as compared with that of an official in another department. Those who expected a controversy were disappointed so far as I was concerned."

Army Takes It as Indication That Administration Will Support Scott.

Washington, Aug. 19.—The action of President Taft and Secy. Dickinson in directing the dismissal of the seven cadets at West Point convicted of hazing Cadet Sutton, is accepted by the officers of the army and civil officials of that department as a clear indication of the purpose of the administration to fully support Col. Scott, the superintendent of the United States military academy, in his efforts to eradicate hazing.

Friends of the accused brought pressure to bear on the president and the secretary of war for leniency. That these appeals were ineffectual is accepted as a demonstration that the president means to follow the letter of the law bearing on such cases by imposing the penalty of dismissal.

She came again last Tuesday as a second cabin passenger in the Birma, equipped with letters of introduction to educators and Russian friends, and money enough to last her for some time. She has short hair and this made the Ellis Island physician who saw her on the Birma order her to Ellis Island. She said that short hair did not indicate anarchistic or revolutionary tendencies, but was characteristic of many women students in Russia, and that it was also looked upon as more sanitary than long hair. PROHIBITION DOES PROHIBIT

Chairman Jones Quotes Statistics That Refute Assertion of Texas Brewers' Association.

OFFICIAL RECORDS CITED.

Representatives of Liquor Interests Declare Prohibition Statisticians Have Juggled Figures.

Chicago, Aug. 20.—Statistics compiled by National Chairman Jones of the Prohibition party from an advance report of the United States internal revenue bureau for the fiscal year 1909, are put forth as a counter to assertions of the Texas Brewers' association that prohibition never prohibits, and that more liquor is sold in dry than in wet territory.

The assertions are contained in a statement which in part, reads as follows:

"On the basis of the official records issued by the internal revenue department for the four fiscal years, June 30, 1905, to June 30, 1909, the fact develops that the liquor traffic in that time has come short of its expected sales to an estimated aggregate total of 389,079,339.77 gallons of spirits and fermented liquors."

"Putting aside the totals of expected increase in liquor production, which did not materialize in the last two years, we find an actual drop in liquor production of 1908 and 1909 from the figures of 1907, of 14,657,329 gallons of whiskey and 2,142,614 barrels of beer. That is, there was an aggregate drop in liquor production for those two years of 2,045,987,585 drinks of distilled and fermented liquors from the total for 1907."

" reckoning that the average moderate drinker buys four drinks a day, the figures show that the equivalent of 1,408,098 men no longer patronize the saloons as they did in the year ending June 30, 1907."

Representatives of liquor interests asserted last night that prohibition statisticians had been "juggling" the figures, and that revenues from malt and spirituous liquors in the last two years have increased.

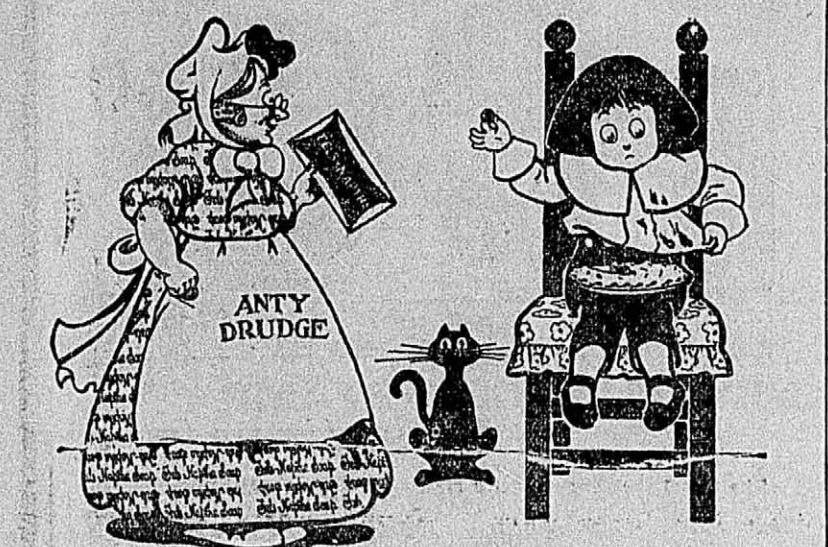
