

Mail Matters In American Fork, It appears that we citizens of American Fork are to be continually in trouble relative to mail matters.

Some eighteen months ago we had our postoffice robbed of something like one hundred and seventy dolars, and it was thought advisable by the postmaster general, that the postoffice here should change hands; eventually it did so. A prominent merchant in this city was selected to hold the position of postmaeter, and I have great pleasure in stating that the short time he held this position he foldied it much to the attataction of all persons concerned. But alss, for some reason unknown to the writer of this article, and I night say to the majority of the offizens here, he was thrown out of office to make room for a person that is, I am sorry to say, no more qualified for postmaster of American Fork than a child is to be President of the United States. Education must have been greatly neglected in his youth, as the following illustration will show. A person going to the office and incurring for mail to the office and inquiring for mali for James Jones would receive Ad olphus Smith's, and vice versa. So you can plainly see where the deficiency is, and these are the mistakes we are daily subject to since this person has held the position of post-

I would ask the people of American Fork, Mormon and Gentile, to investigate this matter and to refer the same to the postmaster-general at Washington, asking him to place some person better qualified for the position in our postoffice at American Fork A GENTILE.

BELLEVUE, Washington County, Utah, August 7th, 1383.

Every Man His Own Cooler-

To keep things cool don't put them on the ice, but put the ice upon the things. This piece of wisdom was not imparted to us by our grand-mother; and, judging from the traditional ignorance displayed around us upon the subject, we should say that the penultimate generation was not sound upon the great questions of summer. The ancient ice box was a humbug—a delusion to victuals and a snare for musty victuals and a snare for musty smells. The modern refrigerator is built upon the proper principle— that cold air descends and hot air goes up; but it still has many im-perfections in scant packing and complica ed drainage. The best possible refrigerator would be con structed on the "Nyce Fruit House" plan, and be protected on all side as well as top and bottom with a non-conductor of heat, which in the order of perfection is as follows: Wool, cotton-seed, planing mill havings, charcoal and sawdust. The space occupied by this non-conductor should be from six inches to a foot in width. The outside case may be made of wood, the inside should be made of galvanised iron, with a par-tition of the same dividing it into two compartments; one-fourth of the space in the upper, which is to contain the ice, and three-fourths below, in which the things to be kept gool are put. A drain-pipe is put into the ice apartment, and the doors the ice apartment, and the doors and lids are made air-tight. All of which requires a mechanic, of course, to construct; but for many purposes, almost any one can make an excellent refrigerator on the same principle in the following manner: Take two dry-goods boxes, one siz inches amaller in each direction than the other; Put; one inside the other, and pack the space with any of the material named. Put slats across the inside box near the top on which the inside box near the top on which
