It had previously been argued twice, and came up this time on an application of the prosecution to amend the record since pro hoc vice. The argument in favor of the amendment was by Thurman, in opposition to Kinner. The court held, by virtue of a recent ruling by the supreme court of the Territory in a craft case, no had the right to order the record amended, and did so. Counsel for prisoner immediately gave notice of an appeal.

In the case against Robert Dickinson for grand larceny in stealing and reverting a horse of the Parowan cooperative herd, and which were previously tried at the seat of the county government of about \$5,000, came up again this morning. The prosecution stated they were unable to secure a conviction with the evidence at their command, and therefore moved a dismissal, which was ordered, without opposition, by the court.
