Sheet-metal boats have recently been patented. Sheet-metal sides are bent under pressure to the required shape, having flanges on their lower edges for riveting to the keel bar, and the stern ends may be joined either with or without stern plates. SECTION 1.—Be it exacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah: That on and after the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty four, no person shall be permitted to carry on the business of merchants, retafiers, peddlers, auctioneers, brokers, pawnbrokers, money changers, travelers, traveling showman, thea Fitzmaurice, Under Foreign Secretary, stated that advices from Admiral ilewitt indicated that he had had a sat-isfaotory interview with King John of Abyssinia, May 22nd. trical performances, circus, and meangenes, without first obtaining a license therefor from the county courts in their respective counties, as hereiunfter provided. SEC, 2.—The county court in their respec-tive counties are hereby authorized to pro-vide for the granting of licenses, as contem-plated in the first section of this act. They shall also provide a suitable book of printed forms with studs, said studs shall contain a duplicate copy of all licenses issued, and they shall be numbered consecutively; said county courts shall fix the price of all licenses granted by them, which price shall be uniform for all licenses of the same class and shall not exceed for any one license of any bushiess anned in this act the sum of one hundred dollars for any one year; Pro-vided. That the price fixed for a guarter yearly license may be made the price for any time less than three months; and said coun-ty courts shall require payment for all licenses invariably in advance.
