THEATRICAL.—Bouicault's beautiful drama of "Pauvrete," or "Under the Snow," was produced yesterday evening for the first time in this city, and to a large audience, who received the drama with marked manifestations of delight. It is decidedly one of the best of Bouicault's productions, and is distinguished by a finish and smoothness of language few of his dramas possess. The plot of the play is compact and not beyond the reach of probability. The acting throughout was really excellent. Madame Scheller, who in the delineation of *naive*, sentimental parts, is not excelled in this country, gave a most charming, truthful and refining illustration of innocence and purity. Every family, and particularly the young ladies, should see this beautiful play. "Pauvrete," with its ennobling sentiments, touching situations and its great moral lesson. Mr. Waldron achieved a triumph in the role of Bernard, of which he was justly proud. It was a beautiful rendition of the part, tempered by a quiet subdued force, far more effective than bombastic rant. Miss Adams played Louise in a truly artistic and winning manner, and her new excellent, careful acting, and the fact she threw into it, it seemed evident that she had made the character a study. Mr. Graham also played Count Maurice with that earnestness and expression which is always sure to win the favor of the audience. Mr. Margolis' Michel also received a good share of applause. His impersonation was interspersed with a dry humor which could not fail to give a charm to the character. Mrs. Woodmansee exerted herself in a satisfactory manner as the Duchess. She appeared to very good advantage. Even the smaller characters were well filled by Mr. Hyde, Mr. Paul and Mrs. Platt.

The *naive* scene was in every respect grand and imposing, particularly the last scene with its brilliant illuminations. We do not think that "Pauvrete" has ever been produced with greater splendor than it has been at our Theatre yesterday evening. The *avalanche* scene, perhaps the most magnificent scene ever introduced into any drama, was given with great effect. Of course, it will be much improved the evening after, in the working of such a difficult scene, hitches occur which cannot be avoided. The Pyrotechnical display, revealing the name of "Pauvrete" in letters of fire, in the closing tableau, was superb and reflects great credit upon its originator, Mr. Millard. Messrs. Millard and Baker are excellent property-men and know how to get up things in fine style, if they feel in the right humor. Mr. Peter Reid deserves also great credit for his mechanical contrivances, so necessary for the successful "launching" of the *avalanche*.

"Pauvrete" will be repeated this evening in an improved style, with an additional outburst of thunder and a terrible increase of noise during the "avalanche scene," for the benefit of Madame Scheller. Need we advise the public to pay their tribute to so favorite an article and lady? An artist, who has labored hard during almost an entire season, to please them. We think not. We advise all who admire an excellent actress and a good play to grace the Theatre by their presence to-night.
