CHINESE BIOT IN SAN FRANCISCO

Our California exchanges, received this morning, contain an account of a fearful riot, which occurred among the Chinese washmen of San Francisco, last Sanday afternoon. It appears that competition has been so sharp among this class of operatives, that in imitation of their Cancasian neighbors, they resolved to have recourse to measures of a protective character to stay the downward tendency in prices. Accordingly, an association was formed, under whose auspices the city was formed into districts, and rules were adopted prohibiting the location of washing and ironing establishments at a less distance than ten houses each side of any other establishment of a similar kind. ST. ALBANS, 25 .- The Fenians crossed the border at noon, to-day, under the command of Gen. O'Neil, and were soon after surprised by a volley from Canadians concealed beside the road; the fire was returned and sharp discharges were kept up for sometime. One Fenian was killed and one wounded. U.S. Marshal Foster and his deputy witnessed the skirmish, and soon afterwards, when O'Neil had gone to the right of his command, arrested him, notwithstanding his refusal to surrender, and brought him in a carriage here. He was taken before the U. S. Commissioner for violating the neutrality tive measures should be adopted against laws, and in default of \$20,000 bail, was committed to Burlington jail.

The arrest of O'Neil has fallen like a wet blanket on the Fenians, and the reports from the front, to-night, say they are badly demoralized. The Fenians fought well, but were evidently not reinforced as they expected. There are not over 500 men about the scene of the skirmish, while ammunition for four times that number had been providid. There is a report that many are returning to St. Albans.

"Amid the din of war, the breaking and bruising and smashing of limbs and heads, the clear, sharp, decisive report of the revolver was heard. Officer Meagher, standing on Fike street at the time, heard the reports of the pistols, and proceeded to the acene of bloodshed. But his single-handed efforts could be of no avail in restoring quiet among what appeared a number of howing demons. He whistled for help, and Special Officers Duffield, Hines, Mc Laughin, States and Irwin soon arrived, but they could do little more than prevent others from entering the house and joining in the fight. A citizen at this juncture went to the Police Office and informed Otheer Jones that two officers had been knied in the fight. This intelligence being communicated to Captain Hanna, he at once started with four men to the scene of simulation. On his way he requested some citizens to accompany him, and they did so. As no proceeded he heard the shots fired, and believing that the work of carnage was fearing he urged on his men. When he reached the house he was obliged to fight his way through the Chinamen in order to get to the door, but, assisted by the four other officers, this was soon accomplished. The Chief of Police, with as many of the detective force as he could collect, were also on the ground, and from their determination the roters soon became conthe Uniuamen resisted savagely. One man atout at the top of the narrow stairs leading to the room, with a six-shooter in hand, and kept blazing away at the officers. Offiour MoLaughlin narrowly encaped being shot by this desperado, a ball having lodged in the door within a few inches of him, after having grazed his cont. Captain Hanna, with some of his officers, held the back entrance, while others watched the front. When escape had thus been cut off, Captain hisman ordered the officers to go up stairs, which was promptly obeyed. Up the men rushed, and as they entered they met with a rough reception, and were obliged to use their clubs to bring the Chinamen to subintssion. When escape seemed beyond their power the rioters made a desperate effort to get away. They rushed headlong down the stairs and tried to force the offic-ers from the door. But just as soon as they reached the landing they were seized, tied together in pairs by the officers, and Digriment inside."

NEW YORK.

ROCHESTER, 25 .- Several car loads of Fenians, ticketed for Malone, passed through here from the West last night; more are to leave to-day. There is great excitement in the Fenian circles. The British steamer Norseman came in this morning and left immediately, the

owners fearing seizure by Fenians. SYRACUSE.—About five hundred Fe-nians have left this city to take part in the movement in Canada; three hundred left for the East by last night's midnight train. A train of about 200 had gone previously in small squads. NEW YORK.-Canadian news causes a great sensation. Eight hundred men are reported to have left here and as command and also that 700 U.S. troops have started for the border.

PORTUCAL

To maintain Independence-Saldanha's proclamation.

LISBON. - General Saldanha, the Prime Minister, has officially stated that he will use all his efforts to maintain Portuguese iudependence.

The Cortes has adjourned. One of the last acts of the session was the taking of an oath by all the deputies to defend the independence of Portugal. This action was taken because of the report of public journals that General Saldanha was in favor of a union with Spain.

The Cortes re-assembles on June 29. Saldanha has issued a proclamation denying that the late movement was in the interest of Peninsular unity.

PRUSSIA.

Parliamentary matters.

BERLIN .- The King closes the ses sion of the Reichstadt to-morrow. Bismarck goes to his country seat at Varzin soon. The projected extra session of the Reichstadt is abandoned.

FRANCE.

Cause of the Portuguese insurrection-An amendment to the Press Law-Reinforcements at Rome.

PARIS.-Letters from Lisbon say that the late Prime Minister intended to LOW, MEDIUM and HIGH GRADES arrest Saldanha; and to prevent this the latter resorted to a military coup d'etat. The Corps Legislatif have adopted an amendment to the press laws, prepared by the Opposition; the ministry unsuccessfully resisted its passage.

It is denied that the French government is sending reinforcements to Bome, meanwhile the Journal des Etats reports that two regiments of infantry and one of cavalry arrived at Tuebon on Saturday and embarked for Rome.

CANADA.

Canadian and Fenian movements-Exruest preparation for fight-O'Nell arrested .- Home Guards repulse the Fe ainas-Seizare of arms.

MONTREAL .- Fenians are at Trout river, Huntington county, and intend to cross the border. Sixty-five volun-teers left here for the front. The 69th regiment is expected from Quebec.

The Fenians at Pigeon Hill, numbering 3,000, are throwing up intrench-ments. The Prince Consort's Own Rifles have gone to the front, with the Montreal volunteers, to attack them. Prince Arthur goes on Col. Russell's Summer Clothing staff.

A battery of artillery has gone to the front; all the troops in this city are ready to move. It is thought that the military authorities will not attempt to check the invaders near the borders, but will allow them to come some dis-tance in the country to get a good Fine French chance at them.
