Moab, Grand Co., April 11.-The Seventh district court has been in session in this county since the 5th before Judge Johnson. The work performed has consisted of the granting of de-crees in favor of plaintiffs in two di-vorce cases, with very little civil work. In the criminal actions of the State vs Lamb, and State vs Lockheart, on the charge of grand larceny and house-breaking, defendants in both cases were acquitted by jurors.
