GRANT'S REMAINS WILL BE TAKEN EAST.
The body of the late Gordon Grant who was killed on the 17th by a runaway horse will be taken to Boston this evening by Robert A. McDonald, of Boston, who arrived in the city Sunday evening.

In the probate division of the district court yesterday afternoon Robert Angus McDonald of Boston filed a petition for the issuance of letters of administration to A. P. Bigelow and R. A. Grant of Ogden for the estate of Gordon S. Grant, deceased. The petitioner says that the deceased died on Oct. 17, and left an estate valued at \$3,700 of which the only heir-at-law is Catherine McDonald, mother of the deceased. The estate consists of an insurance policy, cash and some mining stock.

PRISONER BECOMES DEMENTED.
While temporarily insane Nicholas Gaffney attempted to batter his brains out, yesterday afternoon at the city jail, by knocking his head against the steel bars of a cell and but for the presence of a negro prisoner in the corridor of the jail the demented man would have made a success of his attempt at self-destruction.

It was shortly after the prisoners had been fed at noon that Gaffney began acting strangely. When the eyes of one or two of the prisoners were turned the man began butting his head against the bars of the cell. Within a few seconds the man's head was cut into shreds, but two or three yells from a negro prisoner brought the jailer who with the aid of the negro administered to the injured man until the arrival of the physician. In several places the man's scalp was torn four or five inches and it required 30 stitches to close the wound.

JOKE ON GUARD LEVER.
In the police circles yesterday afternoon Guard Thomas Lever was made the victim of many jokes on account of the fact that while he was chasing a boy bicycle thief and attempting to arrest him, the cylinder fell from his revolver and was lost. Lever started after the thief but the latter started to run and refused to stop when the officer brandished a revolver. Neither

MARRIED TO GET OUT OF TROUBLE.
Lester Bateman, late of Boise, Idaho, arrested in Ogden yesterday afternoon by Detective Pender of the local force and Sheriff Robinson of Boise upon a statutory offense. The complaining witness is Miss Rose Cinson of Boise. As Bateman expressed a willingness to marry the girl, there will be no prosecution. Accompanied by the officiating witness to the county clerk's office to secure the marriage license. Upon being questioned as to their age at the clerk's office it was found that both the bride and groom were under age and that it would be necessary to secure the consent of the parents of both. The long distance telephone was called into service and the parents' consent obtained, and the couple were married this morning by Judge Murphy.

One provides for the assessment of the side walk paving extension No. 1 and 2, in District No. 11, appointing Councilors Carter, Giles, Newel, Miller and Thomas as a board of equalization and the dates of Nov. 9 to the 13th both inclusive as the days in which protests or complaints may be made. The other ordinance creates traveling district No. 9, embracing all the north sidewalk of Sixth Street between Ninth and Twelfth Streets.

Christian I. Munk and Mrs. James Hoggan Summoned.

Manti, Supt. Co., Oct. 25.—Friday last the spirit of Christian I. Munk, a pioneer of these valleys, passed to the great beyond after spending a most useful, industrious life. He was survived by a wife and many children, grand and great-grandchildren. Deceased was born in Bornholm, Denmark, April 7, 1822, making him 86 years of age last April. He came to Utah in 1851 and endured many of the hardships incident to those trying times in the early history of the Church. He embraced the gospel in his native land together with part of his family. The parents have been successful in rearing to maturity a number of sons and daughters who are shining lights in the community.

Mr. Munk has been a most successful farmer and stock raiser. Funeral services will be held from the Manti tabernacle Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

CROP SHORTAGE.

Due to Hail and Frost.—Quarterly Conference.—District School. Special Correspondence.
Randolph, Rich Co., Oct. 21.—The quarterly conference of the Woodruff stake will be held next Saturday and Sunday here at Randolph, and the M. I. A. convention will be held at the adjournment of conference. A concert will be given Saturday evening in the ward house.

The district school is running in full force with Mr. P. K. Kins as principal. Crops are short this season compared to other seasons as a hailstorm destroyed a great deal of grain, which was nearly ripe at the time of the storm, and the late grain was damaged by frost. One of the leading farmers here, threshed about 10 bushels of oats per acre, he usually gets from 50 to 90 per acre, and others have suffered similarly, though not all.

Politics is very quiet this fall, more so than usual. Both parties have their tickets made up. There are nominated for representatives, Republican, Joseph Hodges of Garden City; Democrat, Hyrum Nebeker of Laketown, nephew to Hon. Aquila Nebeker.
