The chief's accounts of moneys received frum these suurces are satisfac-

tory to the board.

ry to the board. Charge 2, specification 'A,' in regard to inefficiency at fires. Very full evidence was taken upon this point, and after hearing all of the evide. or the board are of the opinion that all of the fires mentioned in the specificatio: s were efficiently handled, and toat n more water was used than good judg. ment, at the time of the fire, would dictate. It is easter after a fire to say how much water should have been used than to know during the progress of the fire how much is necessary to p tout the fire.

Fue object of a fire department is to put out a fire as speedily as positite and prevent its spreading; in doing this more water may sometimes be used than a critical examination of the premises after the fire is over show to have been necessary. The use of water must rest largely upon the discretion of the subordinate officers and men, and the board are of the opinion that in all of the fires mentioned in the specifications, both the officers and the

men did excellent work.

Charge 2, Specification "D," that at the Waltner Clothing fire 2,800 feet of hose were laid out, and that in case of another call the chief could not have responded with the hose, the buard are of the upinton that chief should use care in keeping, is possible, some hose reeled which could be taken to anoti er alarm, but in the case instanced the fire was acjoining the Cullen hotel, and the evidence shows that there was smoke in the Cullen hotel basement and it was not known, at the beginning of the fire, whether it was in the hotel or not, and in view of the fact that the said butet was a large building filled with guests, the cum-ulasion are ut the opinion that the chief was warranted to laying out all of the hose that was latu nut at the fire.

Charge 2. Specification "E," with relevence to having steamers out of service. The evidence shows that the steamer at House N. I has been in service ever since the lack of water pressure in the spring, and that it has never been custumary to have the steamers lu active service with a normai water pressure but are always belin readingers for a second call. stes mer in No. 2 house has never been in active service since to g before Chier Deviue's appointment by the Mayor; it is kept in readiness for a secunu call.

The apparatus at No. 2 house consists of hose wagon, hose reel and steamer. It is imperatively necessary that the hose wagon and reel be taken at unoe to a fire, se they must neces-sarily be used before the steamer, and in a majority of tostances the steamer is never used at all, in audition to this there are at No. 2 no places for horses fur the steamer.

There are stalls for five horses of which one is for the assistant chief's buggy, two burses for the bise wagun and one or two horses for the nose reel, according to whether a one or two horse reel is in service; it will therehave a steamer at Station 2 in active service and have it respond upon a firet call.

charge, in regard to taking away 500 leet of huse from House No. 2.

The evidence shows that when the used two-horse-hune-reel was were 2,000 feet of buse at House No. 2.

In putting the steamer in active service, it became necessary to put the one horse reel at No. 2, reducing the amount of buse to 1,750 feet.

This was the best the Chief could do with the apparatus and horses turnished.

Charge five, Specification "G," in regard to not having sufficent force upon Aerial ladder truck

The evidence shows that it takes from une thir to one-half of the etire force of both houses to properly man serial ladder truck, when in ac-

tive use at a fire.

The chief sends out to a fire with the serial ladder truck, two and sometimes three men; a driver, a tillerman and sometimes a man ou the seat with the driver. All of the other member, of the department responding to a c.li are assigned to apparatus which will get there first and which will in all numan probability be used first. The record of the department since the purchase of the aerial truck, shows that unly upon rare occasione has to ly of the opinion that the assignmen of the men to the appara us, by the cnief, is judicious and proper. tainly seems to the board that good judgment would dictate that in view of the limited number of men in the department, those we have should be tire as quickly as possible g, tien to a and upon the apparatus which is first put le service, and we recommend that this disposition of the men b

continued. Charge 2. Sepecification "H" in regard to paroning up fire apparatus extens on and twelve loot ladder, and failure to visit fire boose No. 2 more than once a munth.

The evidence, shows, and the board siready knew that the apparatus that we have has been repaired.

fine heard was endeavored to administer the affairs of the departmen as economically se pussible, and not make requisition for new apparatu where old would render efficient SEL AIGE.

Tue hose wagon at No. 2 house i not as good a wagun as it should be, nut it has always rendered efflores: service at fires and while the buars, would, very much like to peronase a new hose wagen, yet in view of the secessity for economy in the affairs of the city we have thought tout the old wagou could be used with safety fur sumetime longer.

With regard to the hore wagon with twenty foot extension twelve foot ladder, the board listened to the evidence upon the question and also examined be apparatus referred to, and the opinion that the lauders do not make the wavon sufficiently top heavy to impair its efficiency or render it dange Fuue.

In responding to districts in this city to which it is impracticable to send the serial truck, it is necessary to have ladders upon the hose wazon, with which second and third story windows of dwellings can be reached.

House No. 2 was that sometimes he did not go for two or three weeks and som-times wes there every day. The board is of the opinion that this charge is not sustained.

Charge S, Specification "B." It is charged by reason of lack of management on the part of Colet Device. there were, on May 26th and 27th, 1895, only two men in charge of No. 2 Fire House at meal bours. This is strict y forbidden by the chief, and if only two men were left in the bouse on those days the officer in charge of the house in respunsible therefor.

The testimeny was that the captain prepared the schedule of meal hours: lu any event it was reprehensible in the officer baving charge of the house, whether captain or aisistant chief, to allow all but two men to he absent at the same time.

Specification "C" charges Devine with being surly and enal pah, baughty and dictatorial, thereby breeding a feeling of discontent and batred among the men.

The evidence upon this point was c ifigting, and we are of the upinion that the charge was not sustained.

Specification "D," charge 3, charges the onief with fal ure to baimunize the men and alleges that the cuter and assistant chief have nut been on speaking terms for months except When build outly has made the exchange of wurde absulutely . ecessary.

The evidence shows that when the came into the departme t there was a lack of harmony among the men; that there were two faciline and that in particular Chief Donovan and Captain du livan were bister enemies and had some alterestions after the chief came into the department; that in attemptting to reconcile these two efficers Captain Do .ovan took offense at some censure of the conduct of these men towards each cluer and that for a time the relations between the Chief and s-sistant o nef were strilue ; in t last spring this estrangement was remuved.

Coar e 4, with re ereque to lavorit-We are of iam of individuale. Lha opinion that this charge was nut tustalmed.

Charge 5. The first specification charges that Ed. McCarthy acted as unreggirl for ours. Devine, and that no used material belonging to Batt Lake City in making a warurone and family.

The charge that Mr. McCarthy seted as ourse girl was not sustained by evi-

The evidence shows that a wardrobe and a chest of drawers for use in the separiment were made by Mr. McCarthy, but that toe atticles made are fixtures and property of the city.

When the former council obsmher was turned over to the fire department by the City Council, the buard instructthe quiet to make the becomeary changes with as little expense to lite city as possible, and to employ the members of the force in making toe changes, whenever possible so to do.

There were nu clusets in the depart. ment assigned to the chief, and out of old material ou band, the department carpenter at odd times whenever he was not needed in the other work of the department, male a quest of draw.
