WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The area of low pressure overlying the middle plateau region has moved outheastward and now overlies the Gulf states. Another low area has peared over the N. W. provinces. High pressure continues over the upper Missouri valley and a secondary high has developed over the Central Pacific coast. Temperatures are lower over the middle and norther plateau region and slightly higher over the upper Mis-souri and Mississippi valleys, although zero weather continues to prevail regions. Precipitation was quite general over the northern half of the country with snow still falling at time of observation over the upper plateau region and portions of the Missouri and upper Mississippi valleys, and lower lake region.

It is also on the cards that the road may ultimate.y be extended to Brigham City and Coal-ville. For the present steam is to be used as is the case at this time. Later, however, an electric equipment will be installed along the lines laid down in "News" some 18 months ago when plan was originally projected by the Bamberger. It is the intention to have an houriy service until midnight when the freight will be handled. The trip for the passenger cars will be made in about an hour between the two cit-

it is the intention to use the present passenger cars as trailers. The electric passenger coaches will be 50 feet long and each equipped with toilet rooms, sincking compartments, vestibules, heating apparatus, air brakes and 55horsepower motors.

CONSTRUCTION OF 1903.

Figures Showing Track Laid in U. S. From Jan. 1 to Dec. 31.

preliminary statement published The preliminary statement published annually by the Raiway Age, relating to the increase in railway mileage, shows that 5,723.45 miles of track were laid in the United States during the year ended Dec. 31, 1903. This total does not include the many hundred without not include the many hundred miles of not include the many hundred miles of second track and sidings also construct-ed during the year. While the aggre-gate mileage herein recorded does not represent complete returns, it is be-lieved that the few railroads yet to be heard from will not maintail the term heard from will not materially increase

Oklahoma Territory shows the greatest increase in railroad mileage, having 63 miles to her credit. Louisiana is second with 446 miles; Texas third, with 370 miles; and Indian Territory fourth, with 319 miles. The total increase in these four states and territories, which aken together form an unbroken region tributary to the Gulf of Mexico, amounts to nearly one-third of the to-tal increase of the country. It is in-teresting to note in this connection that the exports of grain via the gulf ports have been very heavy during the past year. Of the wheat exported from the ports of Boston, New York, Philadel-Baltimore, Norfolk, Newport ohia, News, New Orleans, and Galveston, over 63 per cent passed through New Or-leans and Galveston.
