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EVENING NEWS.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 1. The prosecution in the Avery case was closed to-day by the introduction of some testimony of a general character and the following telegram—

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5th, 1874. To Col. John A. Joyce, St. Louis. "Cannot hear that any one has gone or is going."

A somewhat lengthy discussion took place, Judge Krumm, in the decision, concluding that there was no indictment against the defendant, and that the case should be dismissed.

The defense proceeded with their side, introducing three letters of a social character, which had passed between Joyce and Avery, tending to show that they were in the habit of using such familiar terms as Billy and Alcock, Joyce's middle name and Avery's Christian name, in writing to each other.

Depositions of persons in Washington as to the good character of Avery were also read. The judge, Judge Krumm, announced that to be the case for the defense. The arguments will be heard to-morrow.

FEARS OF AN INDIAN OUTBREAK. The Republic's Kansas City special says that the Indian Department report that the Apaches have been ordered from Fort Lincoln and Union to the vicinity of Cimarron, N. M., where the Apaches were also ordered to be kept.

One of the Apaches refused to take the rations offered by the agent, and after some words the Indian drew a revolver and shot the agent through the head. The affair caused great excitement, and after the Indian was placed in the rear of the tribe, a general outbreak of the Apaches and Utes will ensue, and much anxiety is felt.

NAVIGATION ON THE CANAL AND RIVER IS CLOSED; the river is full of ice, and the thermometer has ranged from two to eight degrees below zero all day.

CANADA. BELLEVILLE, Canada, 30.—The engine house of the Grand Trunk Railway here was burned last night; ten engines were destroyed. The other buildings were saved with difficulty. Loss \$150,000, insured in English companies.

FOREIGN. GREAT BRITAIN. LONDON, 30.—The postal conference meets at Bern, Switzerland, on the 17th of January, because the London government has announced its intention to join the Union.

DEAD. Prof. Thomas Hewitt Key, philologist, is dead; he was mathematical professor in the University of Virginia in 1824.

SERBIA. BELGRADE, 30.—The sessions of the Suptschina were re-opened to-day.

SPAIN. MADRID, 30.—Mr. Gumbing will, tomorrow, present to the minister of foreign affairs a telegram from his government in a reply to the last Spanish note. The tenor of the American dispatch is considered very satisfactory, and it is expected that the ministerial changes resolved upon in the cabinet council of Saturday night will be announced, will take place on Thursday.

FRANCE. PARIS, 30.—The Assembly, to-day, finally adopted the bill by a vote of 322 to 87; the bill was amended so as to grant the right of representation to all the colonies but Cayenne and Guadeloupe.

URGENT. The Assembly voted for two proposals emanating from the right and the left. One was that the colonial elections shall be held before the 30th of February, and the other that the new Assembly shall meet February 22nd; the plan here the elections on February 15th, and the meeting of the Assembly on March 15th. A committee to examine the proposals will be appointed on Thursday.
