General Andrew Parker, formerly of the U. S. army, died at Paris on the 4th.

The iron-clad *Canonicus*, *Manhattan*, *Wyandott*, *Naugus* and *Ajax* are now fitting at the navy yard, supposed for Cochrane's service.

Judge Cordova decides to accept the sureties on Tweed's bail, on condition that the transfer be made to Tweed's property be recorded.

Immense crowds of depositors, mostly poor people, are flocking to the First Avenue bank New York. Their demands are being fully met at the bank.

Forty-eight of the South Carolina Ku Klux, who confessed, have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment, from one month to two years.

The French Academy will not accept the resignation of M. de Broglie, who is a member of that body.

The first trial of a hostage for the murder of General Sherman will be commenced on the first of the month.

A fund is being raised in Havana to reward the party who may capture General Canby, the hero of the Spanish wars. Comes the insurgent chief and ten of his men have surrendered.

The soldiers of Illinois have passed a resolution inviting their U. S. Senators and Representatives to resign their offices during the week ending 17, 1872.

Adendum to Wendell Phillips on Central.

We will add to Mr. Phillips's illustration of the working of the witness-bullying practice in our courts, an incident which came under our own cognizance. A lady applied for a divorce, basing her claims on a course of drunkenness and ill-treatment on her part, extending over many years.

The preliminary steps were taken, and with the mass of evidence which she could present there was no question of her being granted the divorce. Her two daughters, who had just arrived at early womanhood, had been notified to appear for the defence; and the wife and mother, happening to be in the court, were called upon to testify.

The wife and mother, however, were blackened by the brutal and shameless conduct of the bar, at once withdrew her suit, declaring that she would rather suffer all her life than have her daughter's name sullied by such infamous treatment.

This witness-bullying is for the jury, not the bench; and it is successful in exact proportion as the witness is timid and of good social position. In fact, the witness-bullying is not done for the sake of the witness, but for the sake of the party who is being bullied.

The small-pox in London is alarming the doctors. Right thousand died from small-pox in that city last year—the average for the last ten years preceding being only six hundred.

Several vessels of war will soon be placed in commission, and arrangements are being made at the Navy Department. It is surmised that the North Atlantic fleet is to be strengthened by the purchase of several ships.

Large quantities of arms and ammunition are being sent to the high seas by the Spanish cruisers. A month ago the force on a ship mounting seventy guns, and carrying a full complement of officers and men, was taken to the selection of commanders.

NEW ORLEANS, 5.—The extra session of the Legislature, which met yesterday, in response to the proclamation of Governor Warmouth, took recess till 10 o'clock this morning. The excitement through the city has been intense all day. At an early hour the approaches to the Mechanics' Institute were found to be strongly guarded by metropolitan police, a line being drawn on each side of State House, and corner of Canal and Alcom streets. None but members of the Legislature and officers and reporters were allowed to pass.
