Real Estate Day Takes Record
Crowd for This Year to
The Lake.

ALLOTMENT OF THE PRIZES.

It Was Only Feature Provided on the
Program Except "Music" by Street
Medicine Vendor's Band.

Real Estate day at Saltair yesterday was a record day for the big lake pavilion. The people poured out all day and despite the fact that the train service was the best yet provided, there was difficulty in finding places on return trains after 4 p. m. About 10,000 people less than the 25,000 provided for were present, and this is probably accounted for by the fact that the expenses of a lake trip this year had its effect on the public to this extent.

The water was marked up at 84 degrees and many people patronized the bathing coupons. Outside of the bathing attractions, however, the concessions, as no program was provided. Many 25 cent commutation tickets were sold to the four concessionary attractions—the old mill, the railroad car, the scenic railroad, and the electric theater.

The drawing for prizes was held very late in the evening, and no list of winners could be prepared until those holding lucky coupons brought them in today.

A musical program was not rendered, but the concert band and the companies of street medicine vendor was brought into service and rendered a "concert." Secretary Perkins explains that the band was eliminated so far as hiring musicians is concerned, on account of its expense, and that the Real Estate association depended on the management for a program.
