Clothing and machinery we have enough for flve years, if we take care of it; therefore it is prudent to provide ourselves with the necessaries of life and cease going into debt.

Brigham Young labored increasently for the establishment of home manu. factories. How has this been done? People will get their supplies from abroad and even run into debt for

them. A better plan would be to buy only what we are able to pay for, or go without. A nation that will not do this must suffer for it, and so will indi-viduals. We must produce more than we oor sume.
