RIGBY, IDAHO.

Site for a Manufacturing Center Fine Mill Location.

Special Correspondence. Rigby, Fremont County, Idaho, May -We have had a somewhat backward spring here, although the past winter was very mild and betokened an early season. For the past two or three weeks, however, the warm and pleasant weather has caused all nature to don her beautiful coat of green, which is certainly inspiring to look over this mmense valley and see the long stretches of level land now covered with oung, green growing grain, not unlike rast and lovely lawns. The extent of his great valley, full of good tillable land, with its exhaustless supply of tr-rigating water, is proverbial.
