LONDON, 21.—The Crofters recently arrested in the parishes of Kilmerr-and Glendale, Isle of Skye, on the charge of resisting the sheriff in the discharge of his duties, arrived at Portfee strongly gnarded by 100 police. Portico strongly guarded by 100 policenen and a number of marines. large crowd of sympathizing friends of the prisoners gathered at the landing and for a time it looked as if they would attempt the rescue of the crofters. From the landing to the cour house the crowd kept up a series of vells and several times made threaten
