CAPTAIN BARRATT CALLED Veteran Sportsman and Merchant

Succumbs to Brief Illness at
His Salt Lake Home.New York.New York.Captain Isaac Milton Barratt has
been called home. His death came
quite suddenly and unexpectedly at 3:40
p. m., yesterday, at his home, 437 east
after a sickness of hardly a week.
Thus departs from human field of

Captain Barratt was born in Balti-
more, Md., 64 years ago, At the age
of 24 stories he had frequently heard
of rolden opportunities in the west
induced him to cast his fortunes in
that direction so in 1868, the young
man obeyed the oft repeated injunc-
tion of Horace Greeley. "Go west,
young man, go west." He first located
in Corinne where he conducted for
a short time, a merchandizing estab-

Bathing resort, and when that place
went out of commission. he became
manager of the Western Arms com-
rany, which position he filled credi-

Barratt, was already here, and the two went into the furniture bus-iness, occupying later what was the old Salt Lake house on Main street where the Progress building now stands. Sharp competition, however, induced them to give up the furniture business after having been in it for 20 years. C. R. Barratt was made postmaster of this city by President Cleveland, and died from pneumonia some 13 years ago. and after resigning he was given charge of the bowling alleys and other features at Wandamere for the past season. Two weeks ago the captain was made manager of the Bear River Duck club, where he immediately went to take charge. But owing to sudden changes in the weather, he caught cold. No particular attention was paid to it at first, but it presently attacked his lungs which were not strong, and two days ago, it was evi-dent something must be done. Attor-ney Bradley who was on the grounds, had the sick man sent to this city yesterday in charge of Dr. Hardy of Brigham, and in conformance with Captain Barrait's request, the latter was taken to his home, instead of to a hospital. The unfortunate man

immediately began to sink until the end came at the hour stated. end came at the hour stated. Captain Barratt was never a wealthy man, but he always had enough to keep him comfortably. He was a great lover of out door sprts, particularly hunting and fishing, in which he was a recognized expert, so that hardly any event or not in these spheres occured without his being more or less interested. He was a member of the Salt Lake Gun club, and held official positions in the Salt Lake Rowing club as long as that organization remained in active ex-istence, taking an active part in the numerous regattas which were held on the great lake while the boating fever existed. Captain Barratt was fever existed. Captain Barratt was a good oarsman, a crack shot, and ex-

pert fisherman, and intensely inter-ested in all athletic events. He was also an excellent forest guide. As a game warden he gave the state consalary. The deceased was a widower, his wife dying in 1884, and he seems to have been one of the men who love one woman in life, and can love none other.

It was learned last evening that young Peters was married but had not been living with his wife for some time. Mrs. Peters says that they were marand, referrs says that drey were mean ried in Ogden about seven years ago and lived happily, until Poters began drinking, then their domestic troubles began and resulted in a separation. Mrs. Peters says she saw her hus-band last Friday and that he was in the company of a friend who said he would take care of the young man and get him a job. Peters then began drink-ing heavily and had an attack of de-lerium tremens. He was taken to the city jail, and according to Chief Pitu and Jaller Wikinson, was neglected by the county physicians.
