The Zarahemlaites were more numerous than the Ne-Ne phites; but when the Nephites and Zarahemlaites joined, the two were not haif so numerous as the Lamanites (Moslah 25; 3). Then, the people known as Nephites were a mixture of the blood of Judah and the blood of Manesseh with fully as much of the blood of Ephraim as of the latter. These peoples had a great deal of civil war and tens of thousands of them ware slain. Again, the Gadianton band was made up of Nephites, but they were slain and the band became extinct three different times. At the extinct three different times. At the time of the commotions at the cruci-fixion many cities of the Nephites were destroyed. And the Lamanites a little later on joined the church and became Nephites. Then the Laman-ites who were mostly of Ephraim, for it must be remembered that Ishmael had at least two sons with families when he left Lerusalem were made un when he left Jerusalem, were made up of three families of the descendants of Manasseh who left Jerusalem. Making another deduction for the loss of Ne-phites, and replenishing their num-bers with thousands and tens of thou-sands of Lamanite converts, we have

the entire population of the continent made up largely of the blood of Ephraim
