USSES STATES KIGHTS Washington, April 22.—State's rights was the subject of an interesting speech in the senate today by Senator Rayner of Maryland. Mr. Rayner spoke on his resolution, declaring that in the opin-tion of the senate the powers delegated by the Constitution of the United States must not be enlarged by impli-cation or encroach upon the reserved tights of the states as guaranteed by the tenth amendment. "The trouble with the president is," said Mr. Rayner, "and I always speak of him, not only deferentially, but with great personal respect, that he regards timself as vested with unlimited exec-utive power under the Constitution. ## FIVE FEET, FIVE INCHES.

Civilian Appointees to Army Must be At Least That Height.

Al Trast That Height. Washington, April 24.—No applicant from civil life for an appointment as an officer in the army will be accepted who is not at least 5 feet 5 inches in height. Also if such applicant is color blind for red, green or violet he will be rejected. The minimum for enlisted men is 5 feet 4 inches and there is no restriction as to color blindness. The added inch and the visual re-quitements as applied to prospective officers from civil life, were made re-quisite in army orders issued today.
