Sugar Beet Experiments - Schoo Matters-Memorial Services.

Special Correspondence. Rigby, Fremont Co., Idaho, Oct. 19 .-The weather here of late has been de-lightful, furnishing the farmers an ex. cellent opportunity for gathering their crops. Threshing is over, and potatoes are being shipped from here in large quantities. About every farmer around quantities. About every farmer around here raises from two to five acros of those tubers and although the yield this year is not so good as usual the price paid for them compensates for the shortage. The price now ranges from 65 to 75 cents per hundred, deliv-ered at the cars. ered at the cars.

SUGAR BEET EXPERIMENTS.

Several farmers last spring put in Several farmers last spring put in sugar beets as a test of what can be done here in producing sugar. As yet they have not been called for. Where properly attended they seem to have done well and previous experiments show that beets raised in this neigh-borhood are rich in saccharine matter. The farmers, however, find that if they wish to raise beets they must do more fencing. Accustomed as they are to fencing. Accustomet as they are to turning herds of cattle and hogs into the fields in the fall the late beet crop is soon found by the animals and suffers
