LITTLE ROCK, 2.—Indications are that all four democratic congressmen will be elected. Hancock will carry the State by 30,000.

This city, complete. For Congress, Third District, Cravens, democrat, 1,020; Bales, republican, 1,295, a slight democratic gain on the vote.

DENVER, 2.—The election is passing off quietly. Good weather. A heavy vote is being polled. Republicans are confident.

Golden City, 2.—Garfield 73 majority, a republican gain of 250.

Longmont, 2.—Garfield 337, Hancock 120, Weaver 68.

Denver, 2.—Twenty-two towns and precincts give Garfield 1,240 majority. The governor and congressmen lead the ticket. All the towns show republican gains.

Hartford, 2.—In this city it is likely the democratic majority will exceed 3,000. The republicans are getting out their vote and feel very confident of carrying the State.

9.15 p. m.—There is no doubt but that Connecticut has gone for Garfield by from 2,000 to 3,000 majority. The democrats give it up at this hour.

Meriden, 2.—Predictions are that there will be a majority of 300 for Garfield in this city, and New Britain 100 sure. Vernon will have a republican majority.

New Haven, 2.—A very large vote is being polled. It looks as if the democrats were holding their own pretty well on the national ticket. Bigelow gains on English, though not as much as was expected.

Wilmington, 2.—Incomplete returns of the city show a republican gain of 550.

Chicago, 2.—The *Times'* Jacksonville: Florida republicans claim the electoral ticket by 1,500 and the governor by half that. Many colored voters have been restored to the registration lists by the supreme court. The best posted democrats claim only 500 or 600 on either side.

Pensacola, 2.—Santa Rosa County is estimated at 400 majority for Hancock, a democratic gain of 50 on 1876.

Cambria County is claimed for Hancock by 300, a democratic gain of 500.

Jacksonville, 2.—Indications now are that the democrats will make a clean sweep of the State. Until fuller returns are made from the strong negro counties nothing positive can be affirmed.

Lake City, 2.—Indications favor the election of Bloxham, democrat, for governor, and Davidson to Congress from the first district. The second district is close.

Columbus, 2.—Indications are that the Hancock electoral ticket will be successful by a small majority. In this district the friends of Buchanan, democratic nominee of the fourth congressional district, claim his majority over Cox, independent, by from 3,000 to 4,000 in the district.

Atlanta, 2.—Hammond, democrat, is elected in the fifth district. Clements, democrat, beats Felton in Mitch.

Savannah, 2.—Black, democrat, carries the first district by about 2,000. Turner, democrat, is elected in the second district by 3,000.

Augusta, 2.—This county gives Hancock 1,000 majority. It gave Tilden a majority of 2,300 in 1876. The same ratio would give the State to Hancock by 40,000. It is probable, however, that Hancock's majority will be 50,000 or 60,000, as the republican vote here is larger than at other points. The indications are that the democrats have carried all the congressional districts.

In Illinois the comparison will be made with the vote of 1876. In Chicago no comparison can be made as the city has been redistricted and there is no basis of comparison.

It is reported here that the city, complete, gives 32,500 majority for Hancock.

There seems to be a republican gain in the several wards, but the amount cannot be stated, nor can it be positively stated whether the republican gain will be sufficient to carry the city. The indications are that Aldrich, Davis and Farwell, republicans, will be returned to Congress from the three city districts. Mayor Harrison, claiming that the precincts were not numerous enough to allow a full vote, ordered that extra polling places be opened, after the close of the polls in several wards, and many votes were deposited in the ballot boxes there placed.

There is no certainty that these votes will be counted.

Returns from 42 towns and precincts in Illinois, outside of Chicago, show a net republican gain of 554.

Reports from 35 townships outside of Chicago show a net republican gain of 771; democratic gain, 513; net republican gain, 258.

Chicago, 2.—Later returns show sweeping republican gains in the city, and the election of the entire city, county, State and national republican candidates by a majority of over 6,000. The returns from the county towns may increase this majority to 9,000 or 10,000; a heavy gain over the vote in 1876.

11 p. m. So far as learned and estimated at this hour the congressional delegation in the State will stand: republicans 15, democrats 5. These are as follows: Republicans—first district, Aldrich; second, Davis; third, Farwell; fourth, Sherwin; fifth, Hawk; sixth, Henderson; seventh, Cullen; eighth, Payson; ninth, Lewis; probably, tenth, Marsh; thirteenth, Smith; fourteenth, Cannon; fifteenth, Forsyth; probably, Democrats—eleventh, Singleton; twelfth, Springer; probably, sixteenth, Sparks; seventeenth, Moreyson; probably, nineteenth, Townsend. If this holds good in sight of later returns there will be a republican gain of one congressman.

Indianapolis, 2.—The election passed off without any disturbance in this city. The indications are that a smaller vote was polled than at the October election. Comparisons to-night will be made on the vote for governor at the State election, which gave a republican plurality of 6,653.

The total vote in the city is 19,418, 710 less than the vote of October. In the 6th ward the republicans gain 22. In Wayne Township, this county, republicans gain 32. In sixty voting places, from as many counties in the State, show a republican gain of 25 on the total vote, and a democratic loss of 46; a net republican gain of 71.

Davenport, 2.—In Iowa the vote will be compared with that for governor in 1879.

Returns from sixteen towns in Iowa show net republican gains of 401.

Des Moines, 1.—Returns from the ten precincts in Polk, Madison, Adair, Dallas, Guthrie, Wapello, Webster and Marshall Counties, casting about 1½ per cent. of the State show a net republican gain of 306 over the vote of last year. The precincts, so far as heard from, in the Sixth Congressional district show a republican gain of 208. This is for Gillette a greenbacker.

Fort Scott, 2.—The entire county republican ticket is elected here by 3,000 majority. Garfield's majority is probably 5,000.

New Orleans, 2.—Election day passed off quietly, with the exception of a difficulty between some white men and negroes at the Eight ward, in which a negro was wounded by a pistol shot. Indications point to a light vote here and throughout the State.

Returns from all parts of the State indicate the election of democratic candidates in all the congressional districts.

Annapolis, 2.—The vote in this city shows a republican gain of 154. Wilmer, republican, for Congress, has 85 majority.

Baltimore, 2.—Kent County gives a democratic majority of 117, a republican gain of 135.

Baltimore, 2.—Total vote of Baltimore City—Garfield, 23,354, Hancock 32,677, a republican gain of 878.

Springfield, 2.—A very large vote is being polled throughout Western Massachusetts.

Fall River, 2.—Garfield and Arthur have 1,026 majority.

Worcester, 2.—This city gives Garfield 5,531, Hancock 3,633. Weaver 181; Dow 15; for governor—Long 5,527, Thompson 3,651, Sargent 185.

Almy, 28.—For Congress—Price, republican, 5,439; McCafferty, democrat, 3,553; Brown, greenback, 177; Clark, prohibitionist, 17.

Boston, 2.—The City of Fitchburg gives Garfield 1,399, Hancock 804, Long, 1,390, Thompson 798. For Congress—Norcross 1,367, Alvord 799.

The plurality of Francis B. Hayes, republican candidate for Congress, over Morse, democrat, in the fourth district, is 294. The democrats claim a majority in Boston of from 5,000 to 8,000, but the republicans do not concede over 2,000 to 3,000. Morse, democrat, is elected to Congress from the fourth district.

Later reports leave the sixth Congressional district in doubt, with the probability favoring the election of Stone, republican.

One hundred and thirty towns in

Massachusetts give Garfield 76,923, Hancock 53,062.

Boston, 2.—Boston, complete, gives Garfield 25,524, Hancock 27,659.

The Massachusetts delegation to Congress stands ten republicans and one democrat. The *Journal* claims a plurality in Massachusetts of from 40,000 to 50,000.

DETROIT, 2.—Fifty precincts in Michigan give Garfield 2,082 majority.

10.30 p. m.—One hundred and thirty-two precincts, wards and townships in Michigan give Garfield 9,120 majority.

Kansas City, 2.—Counting is very slow, with many scratched tickets. In the eighth congressional district, so far as counted, Van Horn, republican, leads both the democratic candidates in nearly every precinct.

St. Louis, 2.—Sassinghaus (republican) is beyond doubt elected to Congress in place of Frost, democrat, in the third district.

Omaha, 2.—Returns are slowly coming in, but from those received and from the best estimates, it is safe to say that Nebraska goes republican by from 20,000 to 25,000 majority. Governor Nance and the entire State ticket, together with Congressman Valentine, being re-elected. This county gives a republican majority of over 500. A handsome gain. There are heavy republican gains in nearly every town in the State. The republican majority in Lancaster County is 2,000. The news from New York and other doubtful States was received here amid the wildest enthusiasm. Bonfires are burning and an immense crowd of republicans is marching and singing and cheering.

Eureka, 2.—The Eureka majority will be small either way, for the head of the ticket. The democrats elect two-thirds, if not all, of the legislative ticket. Cassidy, democrat, for Congress, and Belknap, democrat, for supreme judge, are elected by large majorities.

Concord, 2.—Reports are that the republicans are ahead at 1 o'clock. Lisbon shows a democratic gain of 70 in the vote for moderators, and Newmarket a gain of 16 for them on the same vote. No reports of disorder at the polls are received from any part of New England.

Returns indicate the election of Bell, republican candidate for governor, by the popular vote and a full republican electoral ticket. The presidential vote in 10 towns gives Garfield 1,627; Hancock 1,243; net republican loss of 47. The gubernatorial vote for 10 towns is Bell, republican, 1,608; Jones, 1,259; scattering, 11; net republican gain 141.

Plymouth, 2.—There are large republican gains here.

New Brunswick, 2.—The democratic majority is 700, a democratic gain of 500. It is estimated that three democratic congressmen will be elected, a gain of two.

Trenton, 2.—Mercer County gives a republican majority of 500, a republican gain of 45.

Incomplete returns from Monroe County give Garfield 3,000 majority.

Auburn, 2.—Auburn, complete, gives the Garfield electors 1,053 majority.

Buffalo, 2.—Scattering returns indicate that Erie County gives Garfield 4,000 majority. Thirty-nine out of 53 election districts in this city give a republican gain of 1,854. Buck, republican, for Congress, runs behind, but is elected by 1,000 majority.

Brooklyn, 2.—The fourth district of 13 wards, complete, gives Hancock 13,689, Garfield 11,290.

Utica, 2.—Utica, complete, gives Hancock 149 majority.

Otsego, 2.—Otsego County gives Hancock 53 majority, a democratic gain of 16. Dutchess County, Poughkeepsie City, complete, gives Garfield 809 majority, a republican gain of 208.

One hundred and sixty out of 678 election districts give Hancock about 11,000 majority. Returns from 10 towns in the interior of the State show a republican gain of 867, and a democratic gain of 3.

9 p. m.—Indications are that Hancock's majority in this city will be about 35,000 or 40,000. The vote, so far, shows a democratic loss of 25 per cent. Indications are from the towns heard from in the State that Garfield will carry the State by 30,000 to 40,000.

Ninety-six election districts give for mayor—Grace, democrat, 12,550; Dowd, republican, 12,473; for register, Dougherty, democrat, 13,419; Hess, republican, 12,216.

Eight wards of Albany give a democratic majority of 265; a demo-

cratic gain of 1,278. According to returns the indications are that Hancock's majority in the city will be about 55,000.

Two hundred and ninety-one election districts, out of 617, give Grace 42,521, Dowd, 41,181; Dougherty, 43,787, Hess, 38,881.

Returns from thirteen of the sixteen wards of Albany show a net democratic gain of 2,046.

Monroe county gives Garfield about 3,500 majority, a republican gain of 1,900.

Ben. Wood beats Muller for Congress by 2,000; he will be elected to Congress by a large majority.

Brooklyn, 2.—Sixteen of the 25 wards, complete, give Garfield 31,217, Hancock 34,540. The democratic majority, in this ratio, will hardly exceed 10,000.

The *Commercial*, in an extra, says the republicans have carried the legislature. Figures show that Morton, republican, is elected over Girard, democrat, in the 11th congressional district, by an immense majority.

Over 600 election districts, heard from, out of 678, which show a democratic majority of only 32,000.

Syracuse, 2.—Garfield has 1,762 majority.

The complete vote of Buffalo city gives Garfield 2,304 majority, a republican gain of 2,045.

The *Herald* gives the republicans 202 electoral votes sure, and working majority in both house of Congress.

Charlotte, 2.—Both parties have polled a full vote, which exceeds the vote of 1876. Everything quiet.

Columbus, 2.—Ohio comparisons will be for the vote for governor in 1879.

Eight p. m. Net republican gain of 763 in 60 precincts.

Returns from 150 precincts, wards and townships show a net republican gain of 2,600. The indications are that Garfield's majority in the State will be 30,000.

Cincinnati, 2.—Twenty-nine precincts in Hamilton county show a net republican gain over October of 757; this indicates 5,000 in this county.

Murat Halstead says Ohio gives 40,000 republican majority.

Philadelphia, 2.—Two-thirds of the city heard from show a republican gain of 7,127; this indicates over 25,000 majority in the city for the republicans. Returns from the State show a republican gain.

Indications are that Garfield's majority in this State will be from 30,000 to 40,000.

Twelve out of 31 wards in Philadelphia give Garfield 15,426 majority, indicating a republican majority of 25,000. This makes the State republican by not less than 30,000 and probably 40,000. Fourteen wards show a net republican gain over '76 of 5,287.

In Berks county the democratic majority is about 7,500.

Philadelphia, 2.—The legislature is probably republican on joint ballot. Monroe county gives a democratic majority of about 2,500, the same as in 1876.

York County gives a democratic majority of 3,900, a democratic gain of about 359.

Union County gives an estimated republican majority of about 800, a republican gain of 150.

Providence, 2.—Reports continue favorable to an increased republican majority on the state and both congressional districts. The republican majority in Providence at 2 o'clock was 2,747. All quiet.

Returns from fourteen towns and two voting districts, including this city, give Garfield 4,408 majority. Nelson Waldrich is elected in the First Congressional District and Jonathan Chase in the second district; both republicans.

Washington County gives Garfield 2,010, Hancock 1,229, Weaver 32.

Kent County gives Garfield 1,750, Hancock 1,144, Weaver 14.

Returns from all the towns in the state, but six, give Garfield 15,197, Hancock 8,953, Weaver 212.

At Johnson's, in South Carolina, a riot occurred between whites and blacks, the latter tried to seize the ballot box. One negro was killed and three wounded.

Columbus, 2.—The election is quiet everywhere in the State. According to special reports the indications are that all is safe for the democrats. The negroes, where they voted, went almost solid for Garfield.

Chattanooga, 2.—The total vote of Chattanooga is 2,625, the largest vote by 400 ever polled here. The republicans claim the election of their entire ticket by 500 majority.

Nashville, 2.—There is evidence of a heavy vote all over the state.

The republicans carry Chattanooga by an increased majority over 1876.

Galveston, 2.—Unofficial returns from a few scattering precincts indicate the usual democratic majority on the State and congressional tickets. Nothing definite to-night.

Democratic congressmen are elected in the first, second, third, fourth and sixth districts. The fifth district is in doubt, though Shepherd, democrat, is thought to be elected by about 300 majority, over Jones, independent.

White River Junction, 2.—One hundred and ten towns give Garfield 30,346, Hancock 12,518, a republican gain over '76 of 1,968.

Bennington, 2.—Indications are that Garfield's majority will be larger than the governor's in September.

Richmond, 2.—Returns from two-thirds of the city give the regular democratic ticket 4,887, readjusters 362, republicans 2,168. Fifty-two precincts in the State give the regular democrats 9,394, readjusters 1,958, republicans 6,010.

Lynchburg, 2.—The city gives the democratic ticket 1,376, the readjusters 24, republicans 861.

Fredricksburg gives the regular democratic ticket a majority of 212. Returns from sixty-one precincts give the regular democrats a plurality of 1,564.

Milwaukee, 2.—Thirty-five towns heard from give 1,619 republican majority, a republican gain of 872 over the vote of 1876.

Fifty-seven towns give republican majority, 4,325; republican gain, 947. Densler, democrat, is probably re-elected from the fourth district; Bouck, democrat, beaten by Gunther, republican, in the sixth district; Bragg, fifth district, is re-elected by a reduced majority. The total result in the State, on congressmen, is probably a republican gain of one.

Milwaukee, 2.—The republican majority in the State will be 30,000 also a gain of one republican congressman.

One hundred and eleven towns give republican majorities of 5,306, republican gains of 2,648.

CHEYENNE, 2.—Indications are that Swan, republican, is elected delegate to Congress.

Maine, Portland, 3.—A careful estimate indicates a majority for Garfield of 4,500 in the State. The *Argus* concedes 4,000 and a plurality over the Hancock ticket of 5,000.

Columbus, Ohio, 12, midnight.—Returns from 600 precincts, wards and townships, half of the State, show a net republican gain of 9,400, and indicate a majority for Garfield of nearly 40,000.

Detroit, 2.—219 precincts, wards and townships give Garfield 12,150 majority.

St. Paul, 2.—The republicans have carried the county ticket in St. Paul and probably elected two out of three members of the Legislature. St. Paul is usually democratic by 2,000 majority.

Wheeling.—Nothing in reference to the Congressional results can yet be told.

Indianapolis.—Two hundred and seventy voting places, or one-fifth of the State, show a net democratic gain over the governor's vote of October of 124.

Louisville.—Thirty-eight of the 44 precincts of this city, with five precincts in the county, give 4,026 majority for Hancock, which is a gain over '76. The same precincts in the congressional election gave 8,277 votes for Willis, present representative, democrat, 2,685 for Hayes, the democratic nominee, and 6,394 for Burns, republican nominee. Willis is re-elected. The election was very quiet throughout the State. The election of McKenzie in the second district, Caldwell in the third, Knott in the fourth, Carlisle in the sixth, Blackburn in the seventh and Thompson in the eighth are certain. All democrats and all members of the present Congress.

St. Louis.—All the wards except two in the second congressional district of this city, give Sissinhaus, republican, a majority of about 1,300 over Frost, democrat.

CHICAGO, 3, 11.30 a. m.—Returns received from about 300 towns outside of Chicago show a net republican balance of the State, will give Garfield about 44,000 plurality. Culum for governor will have 40,000. The republicans gain one congressman in Peoria district.

Iowa's plurality is about 60,000.

Returns from one-half of the State of Indianapolis show a net republican gain of 695, which indicates a plurality for Garfield in the State of 8,343.

San Francisco, 2.—At 12.30 Garfield had 7,041; Hancock, 7,991; Weaver, 218. For Congress Davis, re-
