**Increased Mail Service.**  
At the instance of Senator Mitch-  
ell the following additional mail  
service has been ordered in Oregon  
by the Post Office department. A  
weekly mail from Eugene  
City, across the Cascade mountains  
to Upper Oregon; the mail service  
on the route from Dallas, Folk  
County, to Portland, Clatsop  
County, has been increased from  
a weekly to a semi-weekly  
service; on the route from Wheat-  
land to Salem the service has been  
increased from a weekly to a semi-  
weekly.

**Chief of Secret Service.**  
The resignation of Col. Whiteley,  
chief of the secret service division,  
to give him an opportunity to close  
his business, H. C. Benson, of  
Penn., has been appointed acting  
chief.

illness of his brother Frank.

**Pension Office Decision.**  
Commissioner of pension office  
has decided, as a preliminary to the  
consideration of a claim, under the  
act of June 18th, 1874, to the pro-  
vision of a pension to fifty dollars  
per month, alleging the permanent  
and total disability of the appli-  
cant, must present evidence, show-  
ing conclusively that he requires  
the regular aid and attendance of  
another person.

**Beecher Preaching.**  
TWIN MOUNTAIN HOUSE, N.H.,  
13.—Beecher preached to-day to a  
similar throng to that on last Sun-  
day, taking for his text the 16th  
chapter of Isaiah, from the 1st  
verse to the 18th inclusive. Beecher  
has seldom preached with more  
power and effect than on this occa-  
sion. His subject to the end  
and the drift of his discourse was  
the duty of religion in man, and  
which he argued to be liberty, that  
liberty which comes from a perfect,  
unconscious, automatic obedience  
to law.

**\$50,000 Fire.**  
CHARLESTON, S. C., 13.—A fire  
yesterday destroyed Wagon's shoe  
store, loss \$50,000, half insured.

**Chief of Fire Department.**  
NEW YORK, 13.—A committee of  
the City Council of Chicago has  
tendered to General Shaler, former  
President of the New York City  
fire department, the office of Chief  
of the Chicago fire department; it  
is stated, on good authority, that  
Shaler has accepted, and is to as-  
sume the office January 1st, 1875.  
The Pacific mail steamship City  
of Priety will be open for inspection  
on Tuesday the 15th, especially  
for visitors from abroad.

**Opposition to Misses.**  
COLUMBIA, S. C., 13.—The repub-  
lican convention has nominated D.  
H. Chamberlain for Governor, R.  
H. Evans, the present incumbent,  
for Lieutenant Governor, and  
L. G. Governor, R. B. Elliott, Chair-  
man of the Executive Committee.  
An independent republican con-  
vention will be called, as many of  
the delegates are dissatisfied, and  
are nominating will be made.

**Mass Meeting Called.**  
NEW ORLEANS, 13.—The Pica-  
yune publishes an address signed  
by fifty-three persons and business  
firms, calling a meeting at Clay  
Square, at 11 o'clock on Monday  
the 15th inst., for the purpose of  
the seizure of private fire arms by  
the State authorities; it is under-  
stood that messengers, to-day, not-  
ified while legions of rioters, as  
they intend to make a demonstra-  
tion in force.

**CANADA.**  
\$250,000 Fire.  
CORNWALL, Ont., 13.—This morn-  
ing a fire broke out in the mills and  
other property were destroyed by fire.  
John O'Reilly & Co.'s paper mill,  
Hodge's planing mill, the Stormont  
planing mill, and the Cornwall plan-  
ing mill, and the magnificent mill of  
P. E. Adams, a saw, lath and shingle  
mill, and an old shingle mill; the  
total loss is estimated at \$250,000.  
It is believed that all the losses are  
insured, but to what amount is un-  
known.

**FOREIGN.**  
**GREAT BRITAIN.**  
Meeting of Amateur Oarsmen.  
LONDON, 13.—A meeting of the  
British amateur oarsmen is called  
for Monday next in this city, when  
an effort will be made to induce  
one or more crews to go to Phila-  
delphia, to take part in the inter-  
national regatta of 1875.

**To be Deceased—Town Hall**  
Burned.  
LONDON, 13.—A rumor comes from  
the Gold Coast that the King  
of Ashantee has been deposed.  
Half of the town of Bonny has  
been destroyed by fire.

**FRANCE.**  
Quiet Dead-Journals in  
Paris, 13.—Francis Pierre Guil-  
laume Guizot, the eminent states-  
man, writer, died to-day, at his re-  
sidence at Valerius. He will be  
buried in St. Owen cemetery. The  
funeral will be strictly private and  
unconventional, in accordance with  
the wishes of the deceased.

The sale in the streets of the  
Journal d'Assurance, has been  
prohibited on account of the com-  
mission of the assassination of the  
4th of July. The Journal Des De-  
voies received warning for the  
illegal circulation of the policy of  
the government.

**Will Burn Pyre.**

RAYONNE, 13.—The Carlist gen-  
eral Lebalais is making great pre-  
parations for a fresh attack on Ray-  
onne; he declares he will burn the  
town this time.

**SPAIN.**  
MADRID, 13.—The German and  
Austrian ministers were received  
by President Serrano yesterday with  
great ceremony and presented their  
credentials simultaneously, in ac-  
cordance with instructions from  
their governments. Hatfield, the  
German minister, said that the Em-  
peror William, in recognizing the  
executive power of Spain, was moved  
by a desire to contribute to the  
restoration of peace in that coun-  
try, and hoped that President Ser-  
rano would succeed in maintaining  
peace by conservative measures.

Serrano replied that his govern-  
ment would fulfill the expectations  
of Europe, and act with energy to  
prevent civilization from again be-  
ing under the influence of anarchy.  
In tenor were exchanged between  
the President and the Austrian min-  
ister.

**Rates of Domestic Postage.**  
LETTERS.—The standard single rate  
is 4 cents, a double rate is 8 cents.  
For each additional 1/2 oz. or frac-  
tion thereof, 2 cents.  
Drop letters, 1/2 oz. rate, 4 cents.

**NEWSPAPERS.**—The standard single  
rate is 4 cents, a double rate is 8 cents.  
Daily (seven times a week) 30 cents  
per year, (six times a week) 25 cents  
per year, (five times a week) 20 cents  
per year, (four times a week) 15 cents  
per year, (three times a week) 10 cents  
per year, (two times a week) 5 cents  
per year, (once a week) 2 cents  
per year.

These rates must be prepaid quarterly or  
yearly in advance, and the date on which  
the subscription expires referring to the  
number attached to their names on  
their paper, namely 1-4 means first day  
of month, 5-8 means 5th day of month,  
10-12 means 10th day of month, 13-15
