If \$500,000 is raised within three years he will give \$1,000,000, and also the residue of his estate.

ganization. Gen. Corbin says it is proposed to maintain an army of 40,000 regulars in the Philippines so long as required and to do this it will be necessary to draw upon the troops now in Cuba. The army in the Philippines at pres-ent numbers about 62,000 men, equally divided between reprises and yolun-

divided between regutars and volun-teers. All the volunteers are to be brought home and mustered out at the place of enlistment, June 30th, next year, and in order to accomplish this with certainty and with the least embarrassment the homeward movement will begin early in the coming Novem-ber. As was the case with the volunber. teers for the Spanish war, they will be brought home so far as possible in the order of their departure from the United States. To do this will tax the transport service to its utmost, and a good margin of time will be allowed to guard against the unforeseen and unavoidable delays.

The plan is to have all the men at their homes and their accounts with the government closed on the last day of their term of enlistment. This is a taks of enormous proportions, and will tax the powers of the entire military establishment to the utmost from now until it is fully accomplished.
