Jim Leary Has Strenuous Time Preparing Indians from Rialto Salt Lake Restaurant.

Practically all the riders and ropers for the wild west show, which will be held at the fair grounds for four days beginning today, have arrived in town. The seventy-five Indians came on their arrival, Jim Leary, loaded them on a street car and showed them the town. The Wyoming contingent has also arrived. A number of punchers and cowboys, who will participate in the show, spent Sunday night in the city. A little wild west show is being put on at the fair grounds.
