PEOPLE'S COUNTY CONVENTION.

At proceedings of this convention, held in the Social Hall, October 2nd, R. W. Young was appointed chairman and C. L. Berry secretary. The committee ou credentials was elected as follows: John G. Smith, T. V. Williams, Richard Howe, E. G. Holding and F. Coalter.

John N. Pike was elected geant-at-arms and Milando Pratt chaplalu. A dreary wait of half an hour followed. Dur-ing this time it was moved and seconded that an informal recess for half an hour be taken, but this was voted down. The committee report ed at 3 o'clock. The temporary or-ganization was made permanent. Prayer by the chapters 4.11 rayer by the chaplain followed.

The call for the convention was

Mr. Geddes moved that two dele gate be selected from each municipal ward of the city, four from the county, exclusive of the city, and one by the county at large, and that ten minutes caucusing be allowed in order that the delegates might have a chance to select their favorites.

Mr. Kenner moved an amendment, to the effect that the delegates be chosen at large, making an argument in support of his motion. This was a county, not a precinct convention nor an aggregation of precincts; the call for this gathering was addressed to the county, not to portions of it, and delegates had a right to vote for those whom they considered the best men inside or outside their own localities. Chev were there not as dictators, masters or employers of their constituents. but as employes, and as such should not transcend nor fall far short of their calling; they had no right to arrange themselves in cabals so that expressions of chnice would be re-stricted to particular persons for particular places. They should do the best that in their united judg. was givenment could be done with all the journed. available material in the county, no matter where it happened to be.

Mr. David McKenzie moved an amendment to the amendment to the effect that each prepersons, and the county outside the city a corresponding number, to be voted for by the whole convention, the two in each preciuet having the highest number of votes to be declared elected. This was put first

and defeated.

Kenner's amendment was defeated, and the original motion was then put and carried.

Kenner made the point of order that preclucts had no right to name delegates; that was the province of the whole convention and not sectional portions of it.

The point was overruled and the various preciucts went into caucus in different parts of the house. There was a busy humming for about teu minutes, when time called, and the following nominations were made:
