Ammonia in Pulmonary Diseases.—As pulmonary complaints are becoming more common in this locality and quite a number are affected in that way, perhaps the following, from the Scientific American, will prove interesting to some of our readers:

At the meeting of the Royal Belgian Academy of Medicine, April 30, 1881, M. Melsens presented a memoir on the therapeutic applications of ammonia, its salts or its complex compounds, requesting that a committee be appointed to examine into the value of his conclusions relative to the question. M. Melsens' communications discuss the applicability of ammonia and its compounds to diseases of the respiratory organs.

The Laramie Boomerang of the 31st says: A passenger on to-day's No. 4, when the train reached Green River last night, jumped from a Full-man window and out for the mountains, under the impression that he was pursued by robbers. MORAL MORTUARY.—The following is the Sexton's report of Moral City, Supte County, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1891: Causes of death—Croup, 2; typhoid fever, 1; teething, 3; inflammation of brain, 2; summer complaint, 2; asthma and dropsy, 3; old age, 1; general debility, 1; inflammation of stomach, 1; accidental, 1. Males, 6; females, 11—total 17.

Purging the Church of Evil-doers.—The subject upon which President Taylor treated in the closing portion of his discourse last Sunday is of great importance—the purification of the Church by the expulsion of evil-doers. That persons who frequent drinking saloons and are guilty of other practices in diametrical opposition to the spirit and letter of the gospel should remain Church membership seems somewhat anomalous. The law of God in relation to such matters is perfectly plain, and the command given by revelation is unqualified: "He that sinneth and repenteth not shall be cast out."

If a person claiming membership in the Church is guilty of any wrong and places any reliance upon his standing, he will turn away from the evil if his position is endangered. When his characters are not dealt with, however, in accordance with the laws given for the purification of the Church, a check that might stop their progress to destruction is removed—the brake is off.

There can be no question as to the salutary effect of a more strict enforcement of the law that demands the expulsion from the Church of unrepentant sinners; the Church would be purged of the only element calculated to disgrace it. That the officers of the Church whose immediate duty it is to carry its laws against offenders into effect require much moral courage, is beyond dispute. Parties guilty of offenses have their friends and relatives who may not be slow to exert an influence against the carrying out of the regulations given for the cleansing of the body-religious from iniquity. But parties who would seek to interfere in that regard become partakers of the evil.

The administration of the laws of the Church, however, has to be conducted with great care and wisdom, as well as with an unwavering and impartial hand. Family relationships as stated by President Taylor, should be ignored. Proceedings of this nature should be characterized by a conservative and merciful spirit, gradually encroaching upon the doors of evil, by first taking up and dealing with the most flagrant and notorious cases.
