It is rumored that Abdul Kader has written warning the French to prepare for serious resistance in Algeria.

It is said that the investigation of the Star route contract system is being transferred to the Department of Justice.

There is a gang of counterfeiters in Wilkesbarre, of which the leader is arrested. Other arrests are soon to follow.

There is no longer a hope entertained by the fruit-growers of Delaware of any profit from peaches in that State this season.

John H. Fink, a retired flour merchant of New York, suicided this morning by hanging to the brake of a Hudson River R. R. car.

Eddy's lumber yard, a coal yard and several stores were burned at Appleton Station, New York, today. Loss \$30,000; incendiary.

The Privy Council of Great Britain has decided to place Dublin under the provisions of the arms act to allow the police to search for arms.

The French troops who landed at Algiers will operate in conjunction with General Logerot, thus completely surrounding Kroumiers country.

The Bey of Tunis has telegraphed the Porte that he will refer the French or any other government making proposals to him to the Porte.

The Bey of Tunis says: despite the entry of the French into Tunisian territory, the high esteem which he has always had for the French is unaltered.

Peter Smith, a desperate character, jumped from the St. Louis bridge to the river, at noon, but was picked up by a passing ferryboat and saved.

General Boett, former aide-de-camp of Don Carlos, of Spain, is arrested, in connection with the legal proceedings formerly took against him in China.

It is said that Wall Street has been buying railroad stocks and bearing wheat on the belief of large crops for 1881, until it is short 29,000,000 bushels.

A messenger has been arrested with a letter to the Sultan of Turkey, announcing the massacre of Col. Feattle's expedition, and asking the Sultan for a reward.

The east and west bound stages were robbed last night, near Sabine, Texas. Major Tell, the only passenger, lost nine dollars, \$1,800 in checks he successfully concealed.

An engine and tender on the Mount Clair and Greenwood Lake Railroad, New Jersey, yesterday afternoon, crashed through the trestle work at Kingwood. Two men were killed.

While a man and his son were endeavoring to preserve some effects from a burning house in Pennsylvania, yesterday, the building suddenly collapsed, and both were burned to death.

A light French column sent April 3d, to reassure one of the Arabian tribes was fired at by two other tribes, and by Kroumiers, but the enemy were defeated with a loss of 40 men.

The fanatical populace of Elizabeth Grad, Russia, in the recent riots, pillaged several houses belonging to Jews. One Jew was killed and several other persons injured by the rioters.

This morning, eight miles north of Weemar, Texas, Sam Brown, while laboring under temporary aberration of the mind, cut his wife's throat, and then his own, with a razor.

The body of Moonie Axtie, of Detroit, was found in the sailboat which was missing since last Wednesday, under circumstances which make it certain the other four persons were drowned.

The Kroumiers dislodged from the rocks on the sea coast are believed to have entrenched themselves

on a height near Sediabtein. All the mountains of Tunis are alive with Arabs armed with flint-locks, each man carrying 30 charges. It is impossible to calculate their numbers.

The trial at Shreveport, of Capt. S. M. Thomas, who killed M. Hough Dickson, his brother-in-law, for seducing his daughter, resulted in a verdict of manslaughter, with a recommendation of the least punishment under the law. The Governor will be petitioned immediately to pardon Thomas.


