For a week or two he has been publishing a little hand bill called the Daily News, in which he has assalled the gambling fraternity and the city administration, particularly the mayor and the police department. He was tried last week on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, and took a change of venue to Justice Burt's court at North Ogden.
