## BADGES FOR NEWSBOYS.

#### They Will All Begin Wearing Them Today.

New York, Aug. 31.—All New York newsboys under 14 years of age will begin wearing badges today in accord-ance with the law passed by the hat legislature. Badges will be issued only to boys between the ages of 10 and 14 years. Boys under 10 will not be per-mitted to sell newspapers and boys over. If can sell without badges. The law prevents girls under 16 years of age from selling newspapers and no badges from selling newspapers and no badges are issued for girls. In order to secure a badge a boy

In order to secure a badge a boy must be a regular attendant at one of the public schools or at a private school and must have the consent of parent or guardian to accept the badge and go into the business. The work of distri-bution is in the hands of the associate city superintendent of schools who ex-pects to issue more than 60,000 badres.
