SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 24.—Dawes pre-

sented House's credentials of re-election

to the Senate.

Yorke presented the memorial of

Gen. Herman Sturm, of Indiana,

setting forth his claim against Mex-

ico for aiding in the expulsion of the

French forces from Mexico and the

re-establishment of the republic.

Yorke offered a resolution provid-

ing that hereafter the Mexican

reciprocity treaty be considered in

open session, and gave notice he

would ask a vote upon it as soon as

possible.

Harrison introduced a concurrent

resolution providing for a joint rule

to forbid the reception of amend-

ments proposing general legislation

or irrelevant amendments to general

appropriation bills; rules.

At the close of the morning busi-

ness, the tariff bill was taken up,

the tariff commission being in the

Senate's amendment to make the duty

on iron 60c a ton; lost.

Maxey moved to strike out iron

in order to put it in the free list;

lost.

Aldrich's amendments reducing

the duty on pyrites containing not

over 3 per cent of copper to 25 cen-

ts, with 21 cents per pound for

copper in ore containing 31 per cent,

was unanimously agreed to.

Maxey moved to strike out the

last part of the paragraph (con-

cerning pyrites) as thus amended; lost,

ayes 27, noes 28.

The next paragraph, embracing

pig iron, iron knowledge, spigot-

iron, wrought and cast scrap iron

and scrap steel of every description,

was taken up.

Sherman moved to strike out \$3 a

ton, and make the duty three-tenths

of a cent per pound, equal to \$6.72

per ton, the rate recommended by

the tariff commission. In the opin-

ion of these bills informed the finance

committee, if enacted, would stop

the furnaces in the industry.

Sherman's amendment was re-

jected; ayes 16, noes 27.

On motion of Platt, boiler punch-

ings or clippings of iron or steel

articles to be admitted at 38 per

cent, and the proviso at the end of

the paragraph amended, "That no-

thing not herein specified shall be

deemed scrap iron or

scrap steel, except waste or re-

fuse iron or steel that has been in

actual use and fit only to be man-

ufactured by re-melting or re-rolling,

but by general consent this proviso

was reserved for further con-

sideration by the committee on finance.

Vance moved to amend the next

paragraph so as to make the duty

on steel railroad bars and railroad

iron made partly of steel, not more

than 25 pounds to the yard,

7-10 of a cent per pound instead of

8-10 of a cent per pound as in the

bill; agreed to, ayes 25, noes 21.

Adjourned.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 24.—On motion of

Cates, of Alabama, Saturday, Jan.

24, was fixed as the day to en-
large the late Representative Lowe.

The House then went into com-

mittee of the whole on the naval

appropriation bill, the pending

paragraph being that making appro-

priations for the bureau of construc-

tion by the committee on finance.

After the Chair had overruled

several points of order against the

paragraph, the committee proceeded

to the consideration of the paragraph

providing for the completion of one

of the double-turreted monitors.

Harris, of Massachusetts, moved

that the contract for completing

either of these vessels be approved

by the Naval Advisory Board, in-

stead of a new board, as provided by

the bill.

The next paragraph was read,

embracing steel ingots, blooms and

slabs, made by any except the
