# HARRIMAN IN UTAH.

#### inspection of the Lucin Cut-Off Now In Progress from Ogden.

E. H. Harriman, chairman of the Union Pacific system, arrived in Ogden on his special yesterday afternoon at 5:15 and after a short stay the train bearing the party, Gen. Mgr. Krult-schnitt, Chief Engineer Hood and other Southern Pacific officials, proceeded to the lake where the night was spent. This morning the party embarked on a naptha launch that had been sent to Ogden from San Francisco for the spi cial purpose, and the inspection of the

cut-off commenced. Harriman in a brief interview stated that the Union Pacific improvements would be rushed and that en-ergies would be concentrated upon the completion of the Lucin cut-off on the Southern Pacific at an early date. Regarding the reported consolidation of the O. R. & N. and the O. S. L. Mr. Harriman declined to discuss the mat-

Chief Engineer Wood, who for the rast two days has been in Ogden, consented to be interviewed in regard to the work.

"We are not meeting such obstacles as we expected to," he said. "Our engineers had sounded deep into the bed of the lake and I knew the composition of this underlying surface. a liquid mud on top gradually getting more solid until it reaches a solid bed of hard clay at a reasonable depth. We knew that this upper portion of muc would be pressed aside but that if we continued filling in a solid roadbed uld be secured. We expected the sinks to occur as the heavy mass used as a fill-in increased by the continual dumping of trainloads of gravel, but our calculations were wrong, as we expected that at least five miles of the route would be so affected and there is only about 1,800 feet, 150 feet being on the west arm of the lake. We have met with this same, or similar, experience in our railroad construction in California.

"I also wish to say that on no railroad construction on western roads has so small a percentage of damage oc-curred. We have only had four cars damaged, one engine damaged to the amount of \$250 and two deaths from injuries received.'
