LOCAL BRIEFS.

To Attend Dedication—Three hundred Butte Catholics will attend the dedication of St. Mary's cathedral, Aug. 15.

Dies in Los Angeles—E. W. Kelly of this city is in receipt of a telegram informing him of the death of his brother-in-law, D. D. Dillon of Los Angeles, from consumption.

To Investigate Goat Fever—Dr. John Sandwell of the university leaves tomorrow for Kanab to investigate the so-called goat fever, for the state board of health. A peculiarly fatal disease is that it affects goats as well as the animals themselves.

No Hog Cholera Found—Dr. A. C. Young, state veterinarian, finds there is no hog cholera in Ogden, but that numerous pigs have been suffering from an inflammation due to improper feeding. The doctor gave the hog owners instructions as to how to avoid such trouble in the future.

Preparing Its Report—The committee having in charge the investigation into the conditions of the state industrial school at Ogden met in Superintendent A. C. Nelson's office yesterday afternoon. The committee is preparing its report on the findings which will be made to Governor William Spry.

Germs at Wandanero—The Germans of this city will have an excursion to Wandanero Friday next, July 22. A program has been prepared for the children in the afternoon and for the adults, between 6 and 8 o'clock in the evening, consisting of a kind of sports, rewarded with prizes, and singing by German choirs.

Death of Mrs. F. J. Kearney—Mary Jane Kearney, wife of Francis J. Kearney of this city, died at the residence of her son, T. J. Kearney, 659 south Eighth West street, Tuesday, aged 70. She was a native of Ireland, coming to this country in 1857 with her husband. They settled in Salt Lake in 1874, but removed to Juab county. The deceased leaves a husband, four daughters and three sons. Burial will be at Calico.

Young Cyclist Hurt—While riding his bicycle and attempting to dodge an approaching automobile at the corner of Main and Second South streets, Parley Williams, 16 years of age, was thrown from his wheel and received injuries that necessitated medical attention. The accident was caused by the front wheel of the bicycle jamming into the frog of the street car switch. The boy was first removed to the emergency hospital, where it was found that his left leg at the knee had been fractured, and later taken to his home at Eleventh West and Fifth South streets.

PLAN TO AID PLUCKY BOY.
Young Hendrickson Loses Both Legs As Result of Elevator Accident.

Clarence Hendrickson, the victim of the elevator accident in the Tribune building last Saturday night, underwent his second operation at the Holy Cross hospital yesterday afternoon, at which his right leg was amputated between the knee and hip. The youth displayed remarkable fortitude during the ordeal that left him legless, and his physical condition is considered favorable for his recovery.

Owing to the straitened conditions of the young man's family, of which he has been the main support, a movement is under way looking to the assistance of the boy. It is planned to secure a sufficient sum to secure artificial limbs for him, and to provide for a business course in one of the local schools which will fit him for office work.

WANTLAND LOSES SECOND ACTION

Judge Morse Says He Was at No Time Entitled to Receive Stock as Demanded.

DID NOT KEEP AGREEMENT.

Options Secured by Him, Upon Which He Based His Suit, Were Not Accepted by the Company.

Judge C. W. Morse dismissed the suit yesterday of William M. Wantland against C. E. Gable, E. T. Brockman, A. V. Taylor and Joseph H. Richards, which was brought to recover 1,315,875 shares of the Pittsburg, Salt Lake Oil company. Wantland, the court held, failed to keep his part of the agreement in that he did not deal with the members of the company. In commenting upon the case, Judge Morse said that Wantland was not at any time entitled to the shares of stock he asked for.

The company was organized in September, 1904, and the agreement claimed to have been made by Wantland prior to the organization of the company. Wantland declared that he secured the option on 10,000 acres of land near the Great Salt Lake which contained petroleum. He set forth that he secured the capital to finance the company and advertise it. In return for this, he claimed, that he was to receive one-third of the 1,000,000 shares of the pit value of \$1 each.

The stockholders in the company contended that Wantland had failed to keep his part of the agreement. He only secured options on 1,000 acres of land, and these options and leases the stockholders refused to accept. Wantland began two suits against the company and stockholders in August, 1907. He lost the first case about a year ago.

SUES RAILWAY COMPANY.

Jessie E. Dolan brought suit yesterday in the Third district court against the Utah Light & Railway company to recover \$15,000 for personal injuries. She declares that a street car gave a sudden jerk as she was getting on, throwing her to the ground and injuring her back. The accident occurred at Sixth West and First South streets on June 2, 1909.

WINS IN TWO ACTIONS.

In two actions brought by the Little Elder Gold and Copper Mining company against P. J. Mallett and Phil Raleigh, Judge Morse yesterday rendered decrees in favor of the plaintiff. The suits were brought to quiet title in a one-third interest in the Seven Seasons well, which is a portion of the surface ground of the McGuffee & Company's placer claim in Bingham canyon.
