the exception of one trip which was de-layed one day on account of high water in the Shoal creek wash which could not be crossed

cannot move and the freight is piling
up at the railroad station. In fact
everything is at a standstill except the
floods and that which goes with them.

DUNNE ON LABOR UNIONS.

Indorses Them, Every Branch of City Gov't Being Free to Organize.

Chicago, March 36.—Labor unions among municipal employes were indors-ed emphatically by Mayor Dunne last night at a street carmen's meeting. That they should not strike was his only proviso. The mayor also declared that the negro shall have an equal chance in obtaining employment on the cars after the municipalization of the street car systems.

He told the Street Carmen's union He told the Street Carmen's union that they might continue their organization after the cars are owned and operated by the city. In answer to a question regarding the organization of the policemen, which former Mayor Harrison disrupted, he said that every branch of the municipal service is at liberty to oversize. liberty to organize.

The mayor said his plan in treating with the present employes would be to employ every one in the service of the company at the time the lines are taken over by the municipality.

A NEW MEDICAL SETTLEMENT.

Chicago, March 30 .- A medical settlement in one of the most congested districts of the West side is the lat-est venture in Chicago philanthropy. The new institution will be built un-der the auspices of the Chicago Tuberculosis institute.

The plans were announced yesterday by Dr. Arnold C. Klebs, who originated the medical social settlement idea. The novel feature will be a large roof garden to be used as a play ground for children.

The building will cost \$15,000.
