Articles of incorporation of the W. W. Burton & Sons Company have been filed with the county clerk. The company is composed of W. W. Burton and his sons and is organized for a period of 100 years. The company is incorporated for the purpose of manufacturing, buying and selling of all kinds of merchandise, farm and dairy products and other personal property, and to carry on a general wholesale and retail merchandising business. The principal place of business of the company will be Ogden City, Utah, and a branch office at Afton, Wyo. The company has a capital stock of \$100,000 divided into 1,000 shares of \$100 each. The president of the company is William W. Burton, vice president Mr. Joseph P. Burton, secretary and treasurer, Mr. J. B. Burton and his wife Rachel P. Burton have conveyed the general partnership of the corporation, \$75,000 worth of the capital stock has been subscribed for by lands, merchandise, and the remaining 250 shares of capital stock will be held as treasury stock.

The injured man was immediately removed to the Ogden General Hospital, where the limb was amputated below the knee. Wallace is 50 years of age, but stood the shock as well as could be expected.

BP. HEINING OLSEN DEAD.

Expire Without Warning at 74—Stake Conference.

SUDDEN DEATH.

"This will kill me," he fell back in a chair. His wife assisted him to the bed when he discovered he was dead. The deceased was born in Denmark, Feb. 2, 1830, and emigrated to Utah in 1851. Lived in Spring City, Sanpete county, until 1882, when he was called to the April conference and returned to Castle Dale to act as Bishop of the ward, which office he held until 1898, when he was released. He was a true and faithful Latter-day Saint, and a true friend wherever he went. He leaves a wife and nine children, seven sons and two daughters, and two sisters and a host of friends to mourn his sudden departure.

DEATH OF MRS. SIMONS.

Veteran of Kirtland Days Succumbs to Blood Poisoning.

Payson, Utah Co., Jan. 15.—The death of Mrs. B. L. Simons occurred here last night at 9 o'clock, from the effects of blood poisoning, caused from running a thorn into her forefinger last August while out in the canyon.

Amputation of the injured member was made by Dr. Joseph J. Smith, who was called to the scene. Mrs. Simons was a native of Vermont, and was married to William J. Simons, a prominent citizen of Payson. She was a devoted wife and mother, and was much loved by her family.

She was born Dec. 1, 1824, near Silver Creek, Chautauque county, N. Y., was baptized a member of the "Mormon" Church in October, 1841, by Truman Ward, being the first of her family to join the Church, and only nine years old at baptism. She was married to William J. Simons, a prominent citizen of Payson, who was killed by her parents and settled in Kirtland, and sang in the temple choir of that place, and was intimately acquainted with the prophet, Joseph Smith. She was married to Robert Loomis in 1844; went down the Mississippi with her husband in 1846, and located in Texas, where they remained until a short time returning and settling in Quincy, Ill., where their three sons were born, viz., Warren, William and C. E. Loomis. The latter is now state senator and a prominent mining man, residing at Provo.

Her husband died in 1853 at Quincy, and she followed school teaching principally, and was a member of the "Mormon" Church, and was a devoted wife and mother, and was much loved by her family.
