relief. She was born Dec. 1, 1824, near Silver Creek, Chaulauqua county, N. Y.; was baptized a member of the "Mormon" Church in October, 1834, by Truman Waite, being the first of her family to join the Church, and only nine years old at baptism; moved from New York soon after with her parents and settled in Kirtland, and sang in the temple choir of that place, and was intimately nequainted with the Prophet Joseph Smith. She was married to Robert Loose in 1844; went down the Mississippi with her husband in 1846, and located in Texas, where they remained but a short time, returning and settling in Quincy, Ill., where her three sons were born, viz, Warren, William and C. E The latter is now state senator and a prominent mining man, residing

Her husband died in 1853 at Quincy and she followed school teaching prin-cipally until 1860, when she took up her journey by ox team to cross the plains nd locate with the Saints in Utah. She traversed a good portion of the distance on foot, and arrived in Payson the same year with her three boys. She was married to Orrawell Simons in 1861. who held many positions of trust in Payson, being mayor many consecutive terms. Two children were born to them, Emma, who died in infancy, and Grant G., now the postmaster of Pay son. She survived her last husband three years, and until the last few years was an active worker in Church affairs, having held the position of president of the Relief society for upwards of 20 years, and was held in high esteem

for her kind nature, sterling qualities and devotion to duty. She was a sister to Eliza Cannon, wife of the late President George Q. Cannon. Funeral services will be held in the
