TYPOS AND THE TRIBUNE.

Union Wants to be Shown as to Own ership of Two Papers.

"The Tribune and its little brother, the Telegram, are at outs with the Typographical union. The union has a rule that matter set in type for one newspaper cannot after being used in that paper be handed over to another newspaper for se by it, unless both papers are owned y the same people. The Telegram has been lifting matter bodily from the Tribune, which was used in that paper in the morning and running it in the evening Telegram, thus saving the cost of setting up a second time. This was permitted by the Typographical union on the assurance of the managers of the two sheets that their ownership was the same. The members of the uniii, however, have "got on" to the fact that to the general public it is persistently held out that the two papers are entirely separate and distinct institutions owned by different parties and in proof of that assertion Manager Butler of the Telegram keeps a lot of stock certificates of the Telegram company within easy access to convince doubters that the stockholders if the Telegram and of the Tribune are an entirely different set of people. The Typographical union also contends that on their faces the articles of incorporation of the two sheets show that they are distinct companies and that the ostensible owners of the stock of the two are not identical. The union has notified the papers that an interchange of matter in type will not be permitted after Dec. 21. Both sheets are objecting and have suggested arbitration. It seems however the typos have got them on the horns of a dilema. They want to make the public believe they are separate institutions and at the same time reap the advantages to be enjoyed by a community of interest." cen lifting matter bodily from the Trib-
