VETERAN LAID TO REST.

Impressive Funeral Services Over Remains of Mrs. Martha Knight. Special Correspondence.

Elder Hyrum Belnap, a grandson the deceased, gave a sketch of her life, which was in part as follows: "Sister Knight was born in Chester, Washing-ton county, New York, March 17, 1805. of goodly parents, being a daughter of Daniel and Abigail McBride, who taught her correct principles and enleavored to see that she obtained fair education. She was married July 6, 1826, to Vinson Knight, and five children were born to them. In 1834 she, with her husband, joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and endured the early persecu tions of the Church from the beginning in Kirtland, Ohio, at which place Bro. Knight was in the Presiding Bishopric with N. K. Whitney and R. Cahoon. This is the bishoprick which issued the proclamation to the Church September 18, 1837, to build up Zion and prepare place of refuge for the Saints. Knight and family moved to Jackson county, Missouri, and continued with the Saints up to the time they arrived at Nauvoo. Bishop Knight with the others, bought the townsite of Nauvoo, and in February, 1841, he was chosen presiding bishop of the Church, (Doprosition he held until his death July 31, 1843, after which Sister Knight was married to the Prophet Joseph Smith, and after the death of the Prophet shi married Heber C. Kimball. In 185 In 1850 she came to Utah and settled in Ogden City, where she resided until 1869, when she moved to Hooper, where she re-sided most of the remainder of her life
