He is Ole Feiring, and very recently made the marvelous jump of 112 feet on his slender snow shoes, breaking the hitherto unassailable record of 106 feet. held by Gustave Bye, also of Duluth. Ski jumping is not only spectacular but daring and dangerous. The jumper starts down a steep hill at top speed and from the middle of the course takes a great leap into the air from a pro-jecting ledge which throws him upward and onward. Rising to a height of sometimes, 50 feet, all his muscles are brought into active play to alight squarely on his skis, for the slightest deviation may result in a broken limb. Following the leap he glides along the level in safety.
