

## B. Y. U. GETS BIG LIBRARY

Prof. F. Warren Smith, a chemist of note and a specialist on explosives, has been a Provo visitor for a week past, spending much of his time in the library of the Brigham Young university. That department has a peculiar interest for Mr. Smith, as in it are some

1,500 volumes on chemistry, comprising a collection made by himself through many years of effort and contributed by him to the Provo school.

The aim of Prof. Smith in collecting books on the line of work indicated was that he purposed some day to establish an experiment school. Meeting President Clark, of the then B. Y. academy, Prof. Smith became interested in the Utah institution of learning, and proffered to put the books of his

rare collection in the library of that school until such time as he should need them.

While addressing the students at devotional exercises a few days ago, Mr. Smith told them that after he had thus joined his books he met President George H. Brimhall in California, and the latter bluntly told him that the library was no longer his, that this university never gave up a good thing that it had once closed down

upon. Although this statement was made more or less jokingly by President Brimhall, Prof. Smith called upon the student body to witness that he renounced forever any right or title to the books, in favor of the Brigham Young university. The declaration was received with thunderous applause by the students.

In the collection there are over 1,500 volumes in English, French, and German, all superbly bound; and the li-

brarian conservatively estimates the value at \$5 a volume. The occasion of Mr. Smith's visit was to bring another large consignment, arrange for the binding of a long list of proceedings of various chemical associations, and help classify the books so as to place them in the best working order.

Dr. Wildtsoe, who has carefully examined the library, pronounces it among the very best this side of the congressional library.
