UTAH COPPER AS VIEWED IN BOSTON

6

Prospective Dividends of Three Hundred Millions Figured Out For This Bingham Mine.

WHAT ASSAY SHEET SHOWS.

Company Making Copper at Cost of About Ten Cents Per Pound -Milling Process.

Utah Copper is given considerable attention in the Boston Commercial of last Saturday, In which George L. Walker gives comment as a result of his late visit to this Bingham producer.

"Utah Copper stock first came to the attention of Boston people about two years ago," says Mr. Walker, "when the market price was \$5 to \$7 per share. It has since advanced above \$39, and at this writing seems to be in excellent demand between \$26 and \$30 per share. A price of \$30 per share means a market valuation of \$18,000,000, or the same that \$60 per share represents for Utah Con-Though this seems a tresolidated. mendous price for an enterprise which has yet carned less than \$1,000,000 in otal net profits, the principal owners of the stock figure out prospective dividends of something like \$200,000,000 or \$200.000.000.

The Utah Copper company is being credited with demonstrating the practicability of treating the geat mineral-ized porphyry deposit of the Bingham district profitably. Col. E. A. Wall is the father of this enterprise. He got together the greater number of the claims which make up the company's property 15 or more years ago, and throughout the period when the price of copper was low and when it was practically impossible to interest new capital he waited patiently for the coming of the time when his dreams of a tremendously profitable concentrating enterprise would be realized. He interested Capt. J. R. DeLamar in the prop-eriy a number of years ago, but De-Lamar's interest was turned over to the United States Reduction company of Colorado, a little later, and D. C. Jackling, general manager of the latter company and now general manager of the Utah Copper company, made extensive mill tests and demonstrated beyond question that the ores could be handled as to yield a substantial profit. "Later on the United States Reduc

tion company purchased from Col. Wall a sufficient amount of his stock to give it a four-fifths interest and supplied ey to build the mill, near the entrance of the Bingham canyon, which has now been operating for two years. The greater portion of the United States Reduction company's holdings were sold, about a year ago, to the Guggenheim Exploration company and an option given on the remainder. Since



management is about to begin strip-ping the surface from this great deposit of ore and, like the Boston Consolidated, will use the steam shovel extensively. Unfortunately it will be necessary to haul the greater portion of the surface material a distance of about seven miles by rail as dumping ground is not available at any nearer

"It is believed that the copper now being made by the Utah Copper com-pany, about 8,500 pounds annually, costing 10 to 11 cents per pound, and that the company is earning, therene, about \$1 to \$1.25 per share of s outstanding capitalization. Figure on the same basis, it would appear that after its new mill of 6,000 ton daily is completed, the capacity of the present mill raised to 1,000 tons and its saving increased to 29 pounds of copper to the ton of ore, it should be able to produce 71,000,000 pounds of copper annually and earn, on an 18cent copper market, more than \$19 per share on its capital stock.

WILL DUPLICATE PLANT.

"It is understood to be the intention to duplicate, within a few years, the 6,000-ton mill now being erected and to treat a total of 13,000 tons of ore dally. These are certainly ambifuous plans and the story throughout has the flavor of a fairy tale, yet a care-ful inspection of the underground workings of the property, a review of the sampling and assaying done by several engineers, a visit to the pres-ent mill and a checking up of smelter results fail to reveal a single weak spot or a contradiction. The whole matter seems to have been reduced to that mathematical simplicity with which a contractor works out in advance the cost of excavating a canal, building a railroad grade or constructing a modern skyscraper office build-

"The fact that there is hardly onequarter of 1 per cent difference in any two of the thousands of samples taken from the ore body, while exhaustive milling tests are proving conclusively that this average values can be de-pended upon, and also that the best practical results can be obtained by reducing 50 too of the set reducing 20 tons of ore into one ton of concentrates, seems to shut out every possibility of failure and disappointment. Given good management, nearly all of the expectations of the projectors must be realized."

SIMILAR TO BOSTON CON.

The same remarkable uniformity of characterizes the ore of this mine that exists in the Boston Consolidated, It is claimed that Utah Copper ores average 14 to 14 per cent higher in copper contents, and that the secondary enrichment zone is 200 feet thicker than it has been found in the Boston solidated. Certain changes are being made in the mill at present, however, which will be incorporated also in the new mill, and these are expected to increase the net savings to 75 per cent.

The son whom he had been trying to save is John Wenzell, 25 years old, an only son.

After serving a stenence in the peni-Antif for burglary, he killed George Spatz, a hetelkeeper, in revenge for having him arrested. The murder was done on May 6, but for his father's ef. forts Wenzell would have been executed during the present week
