Before the meeting was formally opened a beautiful silver sacramental service containing eight pieces was presented to the branch by the ladies of the Relief Society, the presentation speech being made by Sister Agnes Sorenson, who, in a few well chosen words, formally presented the beautiful gift to the branch and read a poem written for the occasion. Bishop Allen accepted the gift in behalf of the branch. There were present on the stand Apostle George Teasdale, Ward E. Pack of the Stake presidency, Bishops H. O. Young of Parley's Park, and the local ward officers. There were also many visiting friends from neighboring towns. The meeting was given to the people as a testimony meeting. 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FAIRVIEW, NEW MEXICO. CHANCE FOR HOMESEEKERS.

In the Fertile Espanola Valley of H. S. YOUNG, Cashler,
New Mexico-Equable Climate.

L. S. HILLS, President, New Mexico-Equable Climate.

Special Correspondence. Fairview, New Mexico, March 19 .-Fairview is situated in the southern part of Rio Ariba county, New Mexico, in a valley known as Espanola Valley, and is about twenty-four miles in length and from three to five miles in width, ly-ing along either side of the Rio Grande river, and is dotted with numerous towns and pueblos, the inhabitants of which are Mexicans and Indians. The latter are very industrious people who are fast becoming enlightened and take

a great interest in educational matters. The soil of this valley is of a dark, sandy loam, especially adapted to the culture of fruit. Alfaifa, wheat, corn, sorghum cane, beans, peas and all kinds of vegetables commonly known to the people of the West, grow remarkably well with proper care. Alfalfa yields three crops per year.

Owing to the customs and traditions handed down from father to son, the

Mexicans do not make the raising of small grain a profitable business; they are the principal farmers in this section of country and in many respects they are at least 200 years behind the times in many control of farming. They are equally methods of farming. They are equally behind in many other pursuits of life and modern civilization. They are, however, a very hospitable people, and are much more agreeable to live amongst than many people give them

GOOD MARKETS.

Espanola, two and a half miles from here, affords a good market for our produce. Alfalfa sells at from \$1.50 to \$16.50 per ton, wheat from \$1.10 to \$1.35 per 125 pounds, corn \$1.25 per hundred. Espalona is also a great trading center where one can buy general merchandise at very reasonable figures. The people also have the benefit of railroad communication, and hundreds of tons of fruit, vegetables, etc., are shipped every summer, either north to Colorado or south to Santa Fe, the latter being a distance of twenty-seven miles. HOW TO OBTAIN LAND.

There being comparatively no govern. ment land in this locality settlers are obliged to purchase their land from Mexicans or parties interested in the grant upon which he desires to locate. The land upon which we are located is known as the Santa Cruz grant. Up to a recent date the boundary lines of this grant have been in question but the writer believes the court of land claims has decided the matter in favor of the grant. SOME DRAWBACKS.

While we have many advantages here it would not do to say that we have no disadvantages, as we are subject to crop failures as elsewhere. As for the climate, it is a very mild, even temperature, neither extremely cold in winter nor warm in the summer. One of our greatest drawbacks is that we are too few in number. There are some ten families here at present and what we stand most in need of is a few more good Saints or families to strengthen our little force here and more partic larly those who are not afraid of hard work. With regard to stock range we have practically none within a reason-able distance: for fuel, poles and saw timber one is obliged to go from twelve to fifteen miles. The people of this branch desire to see more settlers or home seekers come to make homes and build up a strong ward. Such will be welcomed and find a good opening.

Stationary engines and other features of the machine shop equipment have been made in Pittsburg, Cincinnati, Schenectady and other American cities. Altogether this means the employment of an army of American workmen and the influx from Europe of many thouof an army of American workmen and the influx from Europe of many thousands of dollars. Furthermore, the adoption of these American goods means that many of the supplies of the future necessarily will be bought from this country. In practice it is found much cheaper for a foreign country to replace a broken driving wheel, for instance, from the original maker, who keeps it in stock, than it is to make the wheel abroad. This applies to most of the equipment. So the effect of these Siberian contracts is highly cumulative.—Theodore Waters in Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly for February.
