The New Yorkers Take the Chelten Situation Comedy.—Where It Comes From.

THEY ARE ENJOYING SPLENDID WEATHER.

Reports From Foreign Infected Districts.—Abating in the Russian Provinces.

IN NEW YORK.

The People Are Again Seized of the Cholera.

New York, Sept. 15.—This morning opened bright and cloudy and New York is enjoying just the kind of weather to prevent the spread of the cholera.

Two new cases which have appeared here and which were examined by the Board of Health have in no way alarmed the authorities or citizens. People have become educated up to a point where little or no fear of infection prevails.

Immigrant passengers of the steamer "Minnesota," which arrived here on August 20th, seem to have brought the cholera with them. They are quarantined 100 miles. They are removed back to Albany where they received from other cities of Europe, doubtless infected with cholera. When they reached Albany they were quarantined 100 miles, and after two hours of attention and so-called fumigation they were allowed to proceed. From the steamship pier the passengers numbered over the city and mounting.

Four young women went to the house where little Minnie lived. The infection was probably in their clothing as they escaped the cholera. The steamer "Minnesota" left Albany yesterday morning carrying 600 immigrants en route to this country. Among the steerage were 100 Americans and 100 English.

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 15.—The government recently sent a gunboat to Cape Juby to observe the fate of the crew of the "Lucky." The Spanish vessel that was captured a short time ago by pirates was leaving the holding yard yesterday after being repaired.
