The Electoral Count—Springer

Claims There Was No Declaration.

WASHINGTON, 11.—On motion of

Keller, the clerk of the House was di-

rected to inform the members that at 12

o'clock the House would be prepared

to receive that body, in conformity

with the provisions of the concurrent

resolution relating to the counting of

the electoral votes.

At a few moments before 12 o'clock

the Speaker pro tempore requested mem-

bers to clear the two first rows of seats for

the accommodation of Senators.

At precisely 12 o'clock the Senate of

the United States was announced, and

was met by Mr. Edmunds and the mem-

bers of that body, the Senators filed in

and took the seats assigned them, the

President of the Senate seating himself

as Acting Speaker Blackburn.

Senator Edmunds and President Black-

burn then seated themselves at the clerks

desk, and the President of the Senate

announced that the President of the

Senate will open the certificates of the

several States in alphabetical order.

Edmunds, in making the opening of the

order, said: "The two houses of

Congress have met, in pursuance of

the resolution, for the purpose of

counting the electoral votes for Presi-

dent and Vice-President of the United

States cast by the electors of the sev-

eral States for the term commencing the

1st day of March, 1885. The teller ap-

pointed by the House will please take

the certificates of the States in the order

of their names, and the House will

proceed to the counting of the electoral

votes. When New York was reached,

the certificate was read by

Clay of Kentucky, and the following

rumors were in the air this morning

that trouble would be made over the

counting of the vote of New York, a

majority of the electors, who when they

finished the reading and announced

the result, the House took a recess
