

They are old corporations; and it takes a whole lot of time to work out the details for a transaction which involves so many millions of dollars as this one would.

It may take several months to bring about a consummation of this deal, but I feel confident that a merger of the properties mentioned will be the ulti-mate result of the conferences being held between Messrs, Bamberger and McCornick and the several interests in-



UTAH CON EARNINGS.

A Boston authoity states that Utah Consolidated earned \$2,000,000 net for the year ended Dec. 31, or \$6.75 per share. This is against \$3.88 per share the previous year. With the present basis on mining operations, officials of the company believe that semi-annual dividends of \$2.50 per share can be maintained for several years, indepen-dent of metal fluctuations.

IN HUNTINGTON CANYON.

Don C. Robbins Looking After Coal Lands in that Region.

Mr. Don C. Robbins of Salt Lake City was in Castledale yesterday on a bus-iness errand, says the Emery County Progress. Asking concerning his appli-cation for patents to coal land in Hunt-ington canyon, through his attorney, E. W. Senior, he stated that there was no W. Senior, he stated that there was no deal pending with any large syndicate for the sale of the land, but he had secured the necessary means to patent 5,000 acres now and more later, of coal

5,000 acres now and more later, of coal land in that section. "While I am not certain that such will be the case, still I am of the opin-ion that the Castle Valley railroad (or Salina cunt-off) will be completed this year, and as it will run within the 15 mile limit of the Huntington coal land, we will effect a saving of \$10 per acre by patenting our coal land now. If the Clark or Union Pacific people are to build a coal road into Huntington can-yon, the information has not reached yon, the information has not reached my ears from any reliable source. I am shipping three carloads of coal to the Honorine mill at Stockton, where it will be tested for its coking and other commercial qualities. Tests of the coal have heretofore been made, which prove it to be as fine a body of coal as there is in Utah."

The coal property Mr. Robbins is in-terested in is being put in good shape for future development. We learn from other sources that in the past few months he has distributed about \$5,000 in cash for coal land options. Isbor, etc. among the people of Huntington. 

week. Stockers and feeders advanced 15 to 25 cents Monday and Tuesday, but lost part of their gain by the end of the week, but corn fed steers lacked snap, closing 10 to 15 lower. The run today is 12,000 head, market steady to strong, with cowstuff and stockers and strong, with cowstuff and stockers and feeders showing most strength. Feed-ers particularly are in strong request, some hay fed steers from Gunnison. Colorado, 1.027 pounds, selling today at \$4.30, and stockers in the same ship-ment at \$4.35. Two trains of Oregon hay fed steers sold last Thursday to feeder buyers at \$3.75to \$4.40, the lat-ter high grade Herefords, weighing 979 pounds. A few rough cattle sold to killers at \$3.65 out of this shipment. Cow market has not been tested on hay fed steers are selling at \$4.00 to \$4.50, cows \$2.00 to \$3.65. heifers at \$3.85; Meal fed steers are selling at \$4.00 to \$4.50, cows \$2.00 to \$3.60; buils \$3.00 to \$3.35 and veal calves bring \$6.00 to \$7.00.
